Arts, Crafts Group Organized in Acton

Over 60 ladies met in the Y last night to consider the possibility of organizing an arts and crafts group in Acton. Mr. Dick Bean expressed the willingness of the Y to cooperate in any way it could. Sketchy plans were made and an executive elected.

Mrs. W. Wolfe introduced the speaker, Miss Ruth Homa, executive secretary of the Canadian Handicraft Guild and an instructor at the Ontario College of Art. She deplored the inability of so many people to amuse themselves by themselves. Everyone needs a creative challenge, needs something hard to do, she explained. "It's fun to work."

She dealt fully with the problems of such an organization as well as with its benefits, stressing the cost of materials and pay for instructors. The ladies discussed different suggestions and then Mrs. W. Wolfe took over as temporary chairman while elections were held. The following officers were elected: president, Mrs. W. J. Beatty; vice-president, Mrs. George Mason; secretary, Miss Rita McNabb; treasurer, Mrs. Claude Cook.

During the next week, Mrs. Beatty, who with several other Acton ladies, has the experience of the Georgetown Arts and Crafts Guild, will investigate the purchase of materials such as hides for leatherwork and the possibility of instructors, and report at a meeting next Wednesday evening in the Y.

Light refreshments were served after the business meeting while the ladies looked over a display of crafts done by the Georgetown group.

At the fine old age of ninety-three, Mrs. Mary Ann Blair Husband, widow of the late Spencer Husband, passed away on Saturday at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Ross Anderson, 2178 Queen Street E. Toronto. In spite of her years, Mrs. Husband had been about three weeks ago.

Born in Kilbride on November 23rd, 1857, a daughter of the late Thomas and Mary Blair, she spent her early life in that community. For over forty years she and her late husband were esteemed residents of Acton, but following his death about two years ago she sold the home here and went to live with her son and daughter.

In earlier years here she was active in community work and local organizations, the Red Cross, I.O.D.E., the Ladies' Aid and church associations of Knox Presbyterian Church.

One daughter, Beattie B. Anderson of Toronto and one son, Gladstone Husband of Ogdensburg, N.Y. remain to revere her memory and mourn the loss of a loving mother. Rotarians Hear of Veterans' Affairs

"Canada has the most generous war pension plans of any country in the world," said Mr. Morris Searle, Chief Pensions Advocate of the Department of Veterans Affairs, in addressing the meeting Tuesday of Acton Rotary Club. Mr. Searle also wondered if citizens generally realized the cost of wars not financially or materially, but in lost manhood and suffering of the men who served.

In the first World War 60,000 Canadians were killed and there were 100,000 battle casualties. In the second World War 41,992 were killed in action and 53,145 were wounded. Mr. Searle told of the care that was given not only the wounded but the struggle to secure provision for those who were apparently fit when discharged but later developed illness which might or might not be attributed to service.

His thirty years work with Veterans gave him a wealth of experience and the club appreciated his talk on Tuesday. Mr. Searle was introduced by Art Padbury.
