It was decided by motion to hold Court of Revision on the 1951 assessment on Wednesday, October 18 at 7:30 p.m.

A letter was read from the City of Kitchener extending an invitation to Ontario's first traffic control convention.

Council approved of an additional street light on the highway at the westerly limits of town.

Extension of water services and putting in laterals was discussed by Council.

Reeve Tyler reported on the meeting last week with an industry which was going to locate in Acton. The A. B. Greene Co. were cleaning up the Amaco plant on Wallace Ave preparatory to putting the plant in operation. At the start about 15 men would be employed.

A report was also given on an other industry which had been interviewed a few weeks ago and as yet the Company had not made any steps toward locating here or elsewhere.
