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POWER STATION TO BEGIN OPERATION

Acton to Milton Highway Paving Begins At Once

The second line between Acton and Milton will be worthy of the name of Highway before winter. The equipment of the Law Construction Co. of Toronto which was awarded the tender for the paving of the road began moving through Acton yesterday on its way to the headquarters on the farm of Ray Scott on the 4th line of Esquesing. Work on the \$100,000 project will begin today. (Thursday) as the contractor's graders will begin the job of reshaping the road surface prior to actual paving.

Tenders on the job had been called last June by J. D. Miller, Deputy Minister of Highways, with the understanding that the firm undertaking the paving was to have the road completed before winter.

After the tender was awarded the Law Construction Co. on June 26, Mr. Law stated that he thought the work would commence within a month and quite possibly at the Milton end of the road. Changed plans have postponed the starting date for the company however and there is still doubt as to which end of the highway will be paved first. Tests on the road will determine which end requires less work and surfacing will begin at that end.

The Law Construction Co. will spend the next two weeks bringing its heavy road equipment to the camp from Atwood where its workmen have just finished resurfacing highways. These trips have been made already and four or five more are anticipated. Most of the pieces of equipment have to be brought down one at a time on a large float.

Actual paving should begin within two weeks depending on the weather. If the present rain spell continues it will definitely hamper paving activity. A gravel pit operated by Stewart Elliot is located on the Scott farm where the workmen are stationed and MAX tons of gravel will be taken from this pit before the work is through. The contractors plan to set up their own asphalt mixing plant nearby.

Although the original tender called for two and a half miles of road to be paved, it is estimated the distance has been extended to 13 miles. It is a fact that the highway will be paved right to the towns of Milton and Acton.

About 20 acres will arrive in ready to go equipment this week and will be used in the road work. A number of pieces of equipment will be used to complete the work. These include graders, rollers, compactors, and other heavy machinery. Although the Law Construction Co. is bringing in new steel if needed, it is expected that the existing equipment will be used.

Actual paving of the highway will begin in the next few weeks. The work will be done in sections, with the Milton end being paved first. Parents Warned If Children Whoop

In recent weeks there has been an outbreak of whooping cough in the Acton Georgetown and Esquesing area. Since September 23 12 cases of the disease have been reported to the Halton County Health Unit in Acton. In Esquesing and in Georgetown.

The age distribution of the cases has been different from usual. Ordinarily the disease attacks infants and pre-school children but many of the cases have been in older children. The number of cases by age is as follows: under 1 year, 1; 1 to 2 years, 2; 2 to 3 years, 4; 3 to 4 years, 1.

It has become increasingly difficult to diagnose this disease since whooping cough is so easily confused with the characteristic whoop. Rather than show a hard coughing fit which may or may not end up by vomiting.

Any child with a cough of this nature should be taken to a doctor for diagnosis. It is important to determine whether whooping cough is present.

Old Building Will Be Razed at School

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New Power Station Goes Into Service This Week

The new power station at the corner of Queen St. and Hillcrest Ave. is scheduled to switch into operation tomorrow or Monday, adding 1000 KVA (kilovolt amperes) of power to the 1200 KVA which supplies the town from No. 1 sub-station on Willow St.

Hydro officials from the Hamilton office will be present to see the new equipment safely into use and expect that the change can be effected without a power cut off. Unlike the results of the power change-over two weeks ago there will be no immediate and striking changes in house to house power service. Then the incoming voltage in the first sub-station was upped from a constant 12,200 volts to 26,400 volts and the improved service was obtained.

Originally the operation of this new unit was scheduled to begin in May 1949. The work actually started last August and workmen have been busy steadily ever since. As many as four gangs, totalling 30 men, have been working at once, travelling here every day from Gravelly. The maintenance staff came from Preston and the engineers from Burlington. Owned by the Hydro Electric Power Commission and not the town, the station comes under the supervision of the West Central Region and will be serviced from Hamilton when necessary.

The operation of the power station is practically automatic. Standing on Queen St. with the railroad tracks on your left, the station appears to be in three sections.

The upper steel framed structure on the far right encloses the area which contains the station from where the track pulls into the transformer. Since the pull of the wire would be the great for an ordinary pole, the special steel has had to be constructed.

In the center of the group is the 2000 transformer made with dual frequency in mind. When Acton is converted to the three phase power, the transformer will be made very simple. The 1000 kilovolt transformer will be tested before a year has changed its about face in ten years.
