OBITUARY Former Acton Girl Mrs. A. Grieve Dies

Mrs. Andrew G. Grieve, the former Hazel Lucilla McDonald of Acton died last Thursday, October 5th in St. Joseph's Hospital, London, after a short illness. Although she was born in Bracebridge, Ont., Mrs. Grieve spent many years in Acton attending school and the United Church Sunday School here.

For the past twenty years she has been living in London and frequently visited her parents here until the death of Mrs. McDonald. Her father then moved to London and survives his daughter. She had been employed at the nursing office of the Ontario Hospital as a private secretary for the past seven years and her death at the age of 46 is a great shock to Acton friends.

Surviving are her father, her husband, Mr. Andrew George Grieve, and a sister, Mrs. David (Jean) Johnson of Guelph.

The funeral service was held at the A. Millard George Funeral Home in London, conducted by the Rev. John R. Walldie. Interment followed at the Woodland Cemetery there. Pallbearers were Sidney Brothers, Hugh Laltch, Russell Pollock, Charles Powers, Stanley Mark and Percy Allen.

Local Commission Aids Power Plans

Although the Hydro Electric Power Commission owns and operates the new No. 2 power station which begins operation to-day, the Acton Public Utilities Commission has had its part to do for the improved system, which is inaugurated.

The Commission has arranged that the new station serve all the east end of town, the Wool Combining Corporation and Beardmore and Co. Ltd. The former feeder to these two plants from No. 1 station is being switched off to make way for a feeder from the new power unit.

The commission requested a breaker switch, which has been installed at the third line, so that in case of emergency the whole town can be supplied with power from either one of the substations and voltage can be switched from one to the other.

Since spring the commission has had on order an aerial cable to be installed down Frederick St. The advantage of the aerial cable will be that it can be touched by tree branches while an ordinary wire could not and so the trees will not need to be cut.
