Haltos Jerseys were represented by entries from the herds of M. C. Beatty, Kenneth Ellis and Featherstone Bros. at the Western Ontario Championship Show held at Simcoe on Wednesday of last week. Avonlea Records Suzanna, bred and owned by Featherstone Bros., Trafalgar Township, was the Senior and Grand Champion female of the Show. M. C. Beatty won the Junior Female Championship on Lindale Basil Princess, a senior yearling. In same class Featherstone Bros. were second on Avonlea Basil's Wanda. The Lindale herd also won a red ribbon in the three year old class, a second on their junior bull calf, third on their junior yearling bull, third in the junior heifer calf class, second on their senior heifer calf, third prize junior yearling Lindale Ardus Lad, owned by Kenneth Ellis of Hornby. The Grand Champion bull at the Haltos Show, unfortunately was hurt after his arrival at Simcoe and therefore did not show to advantage, consequently had to be content with fourth in the two year old class. Mary Lou Alexander and Ruth Barnes of Norval represented the Haltos Jersey Calf Club in the inter-calf club competition placing ninth and tenth in the strong competition.

**Community Night School Proposed for Milton**

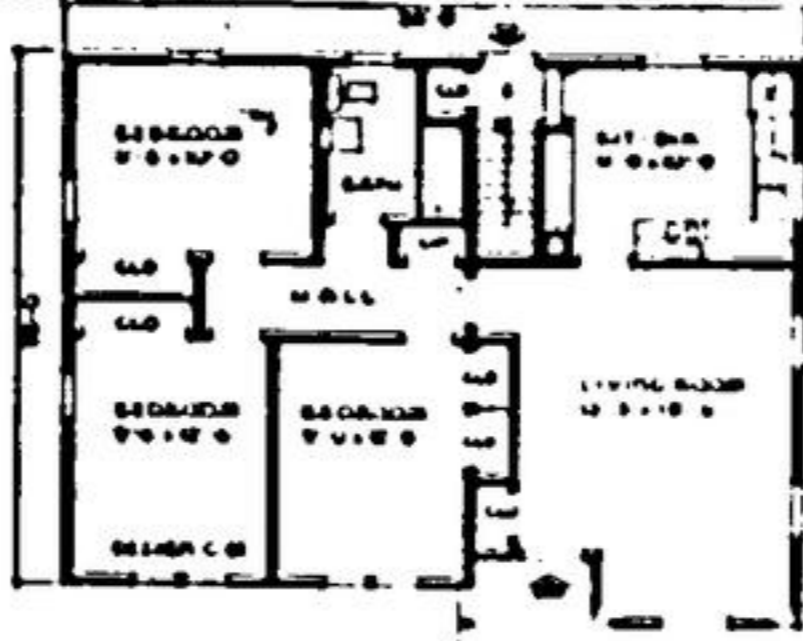

Floor area is 1040 square feet with 2000 sq. ft. of roof.

**Information about Travel Funds**

New regulations covering travel funds were announced by the Minister of Finance on Wednesday, October 4th.

The main point to remember is that Canadian residents require Form H Permit to take out of Canada more than \$50 U.S. or more than \$100 of Canadian and U.S. currencies combined. Form H Permits will continue to be available at banks.

The regulation covering the use of Form H for the export of currency is a safeguard against the export of capital sums where such export would not be permitted through other channels.

Authority has been given to banks and other agents of the Foreign Exchange Control Board to approve applications for U.S. travel funds without reference to the Board for amounts up to:

- \$500 per trip for bona fide business travel.
- \$500 per person in the calendar year for other travel.
- \$2,000 Canadian per year, or its equivalent, for attendance during a full academic year at a university, college or boarding school in the United States.

Applications in excess of these amounts may be referred to the Board and will be approved for reasonable amounts, having regard to the duration of the proposed journeys.

Border Travel - Individuals may obtain up to \$50 U.S. in any calendar month for use on a trip to the United States where the applicant will not be taking out of Canada more than a total of \$100, of which not more than \$50 is U.S. funds.
