Life-Long Resident Allan G. Smith Dies

Son of one of the early families of the district and a life-time resident here, Allan G. Smith passed away in Guelph, General Hospital on Wednesday, October 18 in his 33rd year. He had been in failing health for some time.

Born in Erin Township in 1878, Mr. Smith was educated in Barnockburn School. In 1923 he married Anna Wansborough, the ceremony taking place in Toronto. Mr. Smith was employed for over 25 years with the Beardmore Co. For 46 years, Mr. Smith was a member of the Woodmen of the World, serving ably for about twenty years as the clerk and treasurer.

The funeral service was held in the Victor B. Rumley Funeral Home on October 20 with Rev. R. H. Armstrong, the minister of Knox Church which Mr. Smith attended, officiating.
