Bennett, the supply teacher, Mrs. Arthur Gamble, attended the annual convention of the Halton County Teachers Institute held in the Memorial Hall O.A.C. Guelph last Friday, October 27th. Mr. G. W. McKenzie, principal of Acton school, is the president of the Institute.

The program began at 9:30 with the Rev. Crawford Smith, B.A., B.D., of Knox Presbyterian Church, conducting the devotional exercises and the president G. W. McKenzie's introductory remarks. The recently appointed dean of men at the college, Mr. Herbert Pettipiece, B.S.A., spoke on the O.A.C. with Mr. Edgar Foster, thanking him. The inspector, Mr. L. L. Skuce, addressed the group on the topic of "Classroom Management".

During the morning's business period a letter of thanks from Mrs. Wigglesworth, the wife of the late principal of the Georgetown Public School was read in which she thanked the county teachers for their assistance. The closing of the conference resulted in several changes in the executive.

Dunkin, Burlington; Mr. Leonard Canning, the supervisor of art from St. Catharines, spoke briefly on art work from kindergarten through to grade eight. He was introduced by Mr. Melvin Holmes of Oakville and thanked by Mr. Van Stetter of Burlington.

Musical numbers proved a pleasant interlude in both sessions with Miss Inspectors Mr. Stewart Hutchison and Mr. F. Elliott singing several selections. Presentation of pictures was made to Miss H. Harrison and Miss M. Langton of Georgetown Public School by Miss N. Jantzen. Both ladies are superintended after having taught for over forty years.

About 175 teachers were present as well as their guests. Public school students enjoyed a holiday as their teachers attended the annual convention.

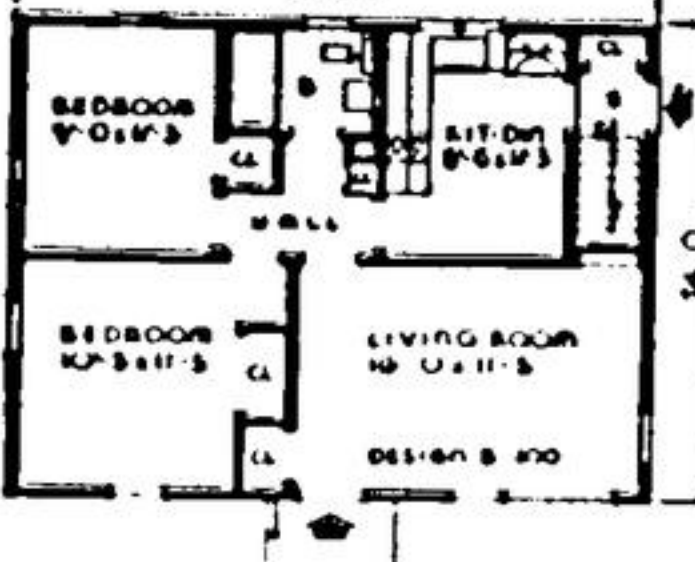

The sporting fraternity of Acton have an option this hockey season. They can overlook the handicap of natural ice and launch an all-out hockey campaign similar to seasons in the past or be easily discouraged by the fact that few towns of Acton's size are without artificial ice facilities and throw in the towel. Either way, nobody will blame them for passing the crying towel around for it is becoming increasingly obvious that enthusiasm for intermediate hockey is virtually obliterated in Acton. Few former hockey executives wish to depend on the whims of the weather while other clubs in the same league are better trained and conditioned on artificial ice. Last year, Acton had an enthused gang of battlers who tried hard to overcome their handicap and although they finished out of the money, most fans were satisfied and gave them good support.

This year, however, the situation is different. The top brass of last season can't organize an intermediate hockey team but they are willing to give strong support to anybody who feels they would like to have Acton represented in the intermediate puck campaign. It's likely the team would have to shop around for artificial ice at the start of the season until the weather is cold enough for natural ice in the arena. There's money left over from last year which can be obtained by contacting either Johnny Goy or Henry Jolley, providing it is used solely for intermediate purposes. Some of the better Juniors of last year are ready for intermediate hockey. In addition to the players on last year's Int. club, the fans of Acton invariably give strong backing to any club. Are there any public-minded sportsmen in town who would be interested in forming a team? We think so — if they are organized.

Fortunately, the town has an ambitious organization in the Acton Minor Sports Club. Headed by a few enterprising sportsmen who show a genuine interest in developing young hockey players, the club will probably conduct an extensive program of hockey again this year for the kids. Surely, if these gentlemen are public-minded enough to give their spare time to fostering hockey among the minors there are enough men in Acton who wouldn't see intermediate hockey die. This old burgh has quite a reputation to uphold in O.H.A. hockey. Let's keep it that way. A good hockey club is splendid advertising for a town. No sense hiding your light under a bushel. Before we get off the soap box may we remind you that in the past it has been done under less edifying conditions.
