Legion Sets Nov. 4 As Poppy Day Here

Wherever the Canadian Legion exists there is an annual Poppy Day appeal which serves a fine purpose in the community. The local branch is holding Poppy Day on November 4, exactly a week before Remembrance Day.

Everyone can make a small sacrifice—a great deal smaller than the ones these red poppies represent—to assist in the Legion work. The proceeds of Poppy Day are used entirely to help needy war veterans and their families.

Veterans' wreaths and poppies are manufactured in special Veterans' shops throughout Canada, so the purchase of this handiwork supplements the meagre pensions of the workers.

Citizens are still carrying the torch flung to them by the war dead by seeing that those who are disabled or otherwise distressed as a result of the war, are not forgotten.
