Spartan Co. is instructed to replace the storm sewer on Young St. and the town will pay the cost as unit prices set forth in the contract.

A price was to be submitted on the cost of replacing the curbs before next Monday. It was felt this work should be deferred until next spring to allow the fill to settle.

Council discussed at length and secured information regarding the lowering of the sewer on Church St. to drain the cellar of Mrs. Kenney. The clerk was given all information. All sewers were from 7 to 9 feet in depth and the Church Street sewer conformed to this depth.

Council agreed to pay cost of removal of tree stumps by Spartan Co. on Lake Ave. and Mr. H. H. Hinton was to be sent account for \$15 as his share of the costs.



Led by the Rockwood Community Band under Mr. E. Scott, a party will march to Rockwood cemetery at 10:25 Standard Time Sunday, November 12th with Captain Martin Bauer as marshal. The memorial service at the cemetery will be directed by Rev. (Major) J. W. Oliver, with Mr. S. E. Scott sounding the Last Post and Rev. G. G. G. in the annual gesture of deep respect to those who died fighting for freedom and peace.

Respect for the dead continues in the regular Sunday service at Rockwood Presbyterian Church which follows, where Rev. Fred Williams will give the address. Mrs. John Freeman will preside at the organ.

Rockwood and all Etanosa Township veterans are asked to attend wearing berets and medals.

"For the cause of liberty, justice and peace", 11 soldiers are listed on the Rockwood cenotaph under the 1914-1918 war and 13 under the 1939-45 conflict. "Let us forget", Remembrance Sunday is being held in Rockwood under the auspices of the Canadian Legion B.E.S.L., the reverend and council of Etanosa Township and with arrangements by the Community Club special committee.

New School Open At Glen Williams

A milestone in the history of Glen Williams was the official opening of the beautiful new three-room school Monday evening, Oct. 30th. Hon. Dana Porter, K.C., Ontario Minister of Education, was an honored guest and pronounced the school opened after commenting briefly on the importance of the occasion.

Stanley Hall, Provincial member of Parliament for Halton and school inspector L. L. Skuce were also speakers, as was Esquering reeve, George Currie, John Bingham, chairman of the township school area board which administers the school, was chairman for the evening and briefly sketched the details of the new building which was constructed by J. B. Mackenzie and Son, wired and heated by George Mueckart and painted by McLeod and Frank of Acton. Murton and Evans of Hamilton were architects.

Prior to the speeches, school pupils presented a musical program. Miss Marion Hepburn, music teacher at the school, accompanied at the piano and also sang two numbers with Mrs. Jack Add at the piano.

An interesting feature of the program was the story of the village told in instalments by some of the pupils. Mr. Porter said that in many school openings which he had attended, this was something very unique and he complimented the staff on the idea.

Present on the platform were members of the school board, R. H. Hunter, R. L. Davidson, Hector Bird and William Dobbie, as well as secretary-treasurer Ruth Evans, Deputy Reeve George Leslie and Councillors Walter Linham and Craig Reid were also on the platform.

Mr. Skuce introduced all the officials, including Mrs. Edna Beaumont and Mrs. Nellie Gardner, members of the staff. Mrs. Porter, Mrs. Hall and Mrs. Skuce were presented with bouquets of flowers and the guests were served refreshments after the program was ended. William Kozack spoke for the Glen residents in complimenting those responsible for their work in providing a fine new school for the village.

In honor of the occasion, Hon. D. Porter proclaimed a holiday on a day this week to be set by the principal.

LETTER TO RATEPAYERS

School Board Tells Of Pressing Need


We, the Acton Public School Board, desire at this time to bring to the attention of the taxpayers of Acton, the need for additional accommodation at the Public School.

Appearing elsewhere in this paper is an announcement showing some of the main reasons why this accommodation is needed. Several factors have forced the issue, such as condemned school heating plant, inadequate toilet and washroom facilities and especially the overcrowding of our present school.

Therefore, ever conscious of our responsibilities, architects were engaged who provided sketch plans for the proposed school expansion with a new heating plant to heat the Public School rooms and the High School, also washroom facilities for the entire Public School.

Sketch plans, after having been approved by the Department of Education, were submitted to Council June 7th. Council approved the program and requested an estimate. Final working plans, specifications and estimate have been provided by the architects and these were presented to Council at a Joint Council-School Board meeting held on Thursday, Nov. 2nd, 1950. Council unanimously endorsed the plans of the Board and requested Solicitor Leatherland to prepare a by-law for presentation to the ratepayers at next election.

The most recent addition to the Public School was built in 1892 when the population of Acton was less than 1500. The most recent census of the town of Acton shows the population to be over 3,000. Signed on behalf of the Board,
