Sunday School Lesson

SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 12
ENRICHING OUR CHRISTIAN FRIENDSHIP

Golden Text. Let each of you look not only to his own interests but also to the interests of others. Have this mind among yourselves which you have in Christ Jesus who though he was in the form of God did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped. Phil. 2: 6

Lesson Text. Ac. 11: 11-18; Phil 2: 1-5

Exposition. I. The Christ Peter Preached. Ac. 11: 11-18

The tenth chapter of Acts should be studied carefully in connection with this lesson. When God sends men to us and for us they are the men we should go with, whether they are those whom we would naturally have chosen or not. Peter's faith was equal to the occasion; he obeyed orders without hesitation or question (v. 12; cf. ch. 10: 21-23). When he arrived in Joppa, Cornelius told Peter and the six about how he had seen the angel who had said to him, "Fetch Simon, whose surname is Peter" (v. 13; cf. ch. 10: 30-33). V. 14 contains an important detail not found in the 10th chapter: it tells us plainly that Cornelius was not a saved man until he heard the Gospel through Peter's lips.

We are told that Peter waked up to him words whereby he and all his house could "be saved"; so it is clear that neither Cornelius nor anyone in his household was saved until they heard these words of Peter. If it were not for this plain statement we might think that Cornelius was saved by his devotion, alms, prayers and righteous works, indeed there are many who do teach that, but this verse plainly declares that this was not so. God took account of Cornelius' prayers and alms, his sincerity of heart and desire for truth (ch. 10: 4), and sent him the truth where, by he and his house were to be saved, but he was not saved until he had heard the truth about Jesus and was himself led to believe on Jesus Himself (ch. 10: 43, 44). V. 14 also teaches us that we are saved by what we hear (Rom. 10: 17).

Vs. 15 and 16 make it clear that the outpouring of the Holy Spirit upon Cornelius and the others was a "baptism with the Holy Spirit." Peter says that when he saw what occurred he remembered "the word of the Lord, how that he said, John indeed baptized with water; but ye shall be baptized with the Holy Ghost." There are those who deny this, and tell us that the phrase "baptized with the Holy Spirit" should be confined to Pentecostal experience, but it is definitely stated in ch. 10 that the Spirit was poured out on the Gentiles in Cornelius' house (v. 45). It is evident, also, that the "baptism with the Holy Spirit" is not merely an experience given to the church as a body, but for the individual believer.

II. The Christ Paul Preached. Phil. 2: 1-5.

Plan Rose-Covered Hedges in Ontario

Ugly weed-ridden fences may give way to rose-strewed hedges in western Ontario if a movement begun by the Crumlin Sportsmen's Association, London, catches on.

The association plans next spring to introduce to district fields a plant known as the Multiflora Rose, a flowering hedge which in the past 10 years has taken the farm Middle West in the United States by storm.

Members of the Crumlin Association bedded down for the winter 3,000 Multiflora Rose plants. Next spring they will be given to club members and area farmers for planting as windbreaks and hedges.

As far as is known, the Crumlin project is the first introduction in any amount of the colorful hedge rose into southwestern Ontario.

The project began last year when 200 seedling plants were bedded down.

The Multiflora Rose, a native of eastern Asia, is a triple-barked woody vine which grows to 30 feet. It acts as a windbreak hedge for cattle and livestock, and is an effective barrier.

"Operation Cattle Lift" Successful

Large-scale transportation by air of livestock from Canada and the United States to Latin America countries on a 24-hour run that carries animals directly from farm to kennels has opened the door to exciting possibilities for South American agriculture and for North American breeders according to the Reader's Digest.

The successful transportation of \$100,000 worth of animals to Columbia by air freight as part of the Government's livestock betterment program is being watched with great interest by North and South Americans alike.

The operation calls for 36 flights monthly, 1,000 animals and 4,000 chickens and turkeys during 1950. The U.S.A. is very 17,000 pounds live weight and the total cost of the flights and handling is about \$1.25 per pound of live weight.

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Costa Rica delivery. The Columbian Farm Loan Bank which purchased the animals offers them to Columbian farmers almost at cost, the money going back into a revolving fund to buy more livestock.

The Hays brothers of Calgary who breed and sell cattle in Alberta and Ontario, deliver dairy stock to Bermuda, Cuba and South America. In addition to this many private breeders are using air delivery as a regular thing. Albert Stagg of Oakville, Ontario, another Holstein dealer started air deliveries to Italy two years ago. And purchased Jersey from the Brampton Ontario herd of B. H. Bull and Sons have been flown to Jamaica, Mexico and four South American countries.


