Board in this project. The Board hopes to inaugurate a campaign informing the citizens of the necessity and advantages of the new building.

Solicitor Leatherland informed Council that a by-law would have to be passed so the question could be voted on at the municipal elections. If the vote is in favour, the Council can then go to the Municipal Board for authority to issue the necessary debentures.

Councillor Greer stated he would like to see a whole new school built, and also objected to the site. His contention was that people driving through the town never saw the school.

Mayor Mason asked if Council were 100 per cent in favour of the School Board plans. They were.

Chairman Oakes stated that there were growing pains in all departments of the town at the present time with each department having to increase staff and facilities.

This resolution was passed by Council, sponsored by E. Tyler and J. Hargrave: "And resolved that this Council endorse the plans of the School Board and have Mr. Leatherland draw up the necessary by-law to present to Council for Monday, November 6, 1950."—Carried.

W. Wolfe and F. Oakes thanked Council for their co-operation and hearing of their plans before the school board adjourned. Mayor A. Mason, Reeve E. Tyler, Councillors J. Greer, J. Hargrave, and W. Roszell were the Council members present. Chairman Dr. F. Oakes, C. Heard, W. Wolfe and J. Creamy, ton represented the School Board along with Principal G. McKenzie and the Secretaries, W. Middleton and J. McGeachie.
