Latest Telephone Directory For Acton Has 180 Pages, Is Delivered This Week
Back in 1878, a telephone subscriber could pull out a sheet about eighteen inches long from his inside pocket and find there the names of 68 people who had a telephone. That was Canada's first telephone directory.
You couldn't do that to-day with Acton's new directory. The one-page listing has grown into a sizeable book which contains 12,228 new and changed listings alone. The new November 1950 edition of the telephone directory is being delivered to subscribers here this week.
There are 180 alphabetical pages in the new book which contains listings for Kitchener-Waterloo, Galt, Guelph, Acton, Arthur, Ayr, Baden, Belwood, Breslau, Elmira, Elora, Fergus, Hespler, Linwood, New Dundee, New Hamburg, Preston, Rockwood and Wellesley.
In view of the large number of changes, J. I. Sanderson, Bell Telephone manager here, advises subscribers to discard last year's buff-covered book. He also suggests that office desk-pads, note-books or cards pinned to the wall should be checked and changed, if necessary, in line with the thousands of revisions appearing in the new edition.
The frequent corrections that are received when the number one is eliminated, to the benefit of both the caller and the telephone operator. The change in numbers was all for the best, however, as fewer rings will be heard on each party line as a result of the change.
Subscribers should also give the obsolete directories a thorough "shaking out" before they are discarded as old books have been found to contain documents folded money and letters.

Bell Manager For District Announced
It Grant Dillane of Toronto has been appointed Bell Telephone manager for Guelph, Acton and vicinity effective December 1, it was announced this week. In addition, Mr Dillane will also have supervision over the company's offices in Arthur, Elora, Fergus and Rockwood.
John I. Sanderson, who has been Bell's manager for this area for a quarter of a century, will move to a management in London. Due to the continued growth of that region, the Bell Company has established the position of London suburban manager and Mr Sanderson will be its first occupant. Five exchanges will be under his direction.

Mr Sanderson who was appointed manager for Guelph and vicinity on September 16, 1925 began his telephone career in Montreal on June 1, 1921. On September 1, 1922 he was transferred to Hamilton and for five months during 1923-24 between May 1 and October 1 he was acting manager in Guelph. Then after serving as chief clerk in the London division and as acting commercial supervisor in Windsor he came to Guelph as manager.
Born in Worcester Ont. he was educated in Toronto. Before enlisting in the 33rd Battery, Canadian Field Artillery in 1915, he studied forestry for two years at the University of Toronto. He went overseas in 1916 and in December, 1917, transferred to the Royal Naval Air Service—later the Royal Air Force—as a lieutenant. Wounded on September 18, 1918, he spent 14 months in hospital before returning to Canada in December 1919.
Widely known in this district, Mr Sanderson is president of the Guelph Golf and Country Club, a past president of both the Board of Trade and the Kiwanis Club. He has been a trustee of the Canadian Legion for 30 years and a member of the Guelph Garrison Club since 1926.
He is married and has two daughters.
Born in Schomberg Ont., Raymond Grant Dillane entered Bell Telephone service in Toronto on January 22, 1930. Before the war, he had a broad experience in business offices and sales work there. Granted leave of absence in December, 1941, he enlisted in the Royal Canadian Air Force as an AC2. Engaged in radar work, he was stationed at the University of Toronto and at Clinton, Ont., before going overseas. After his discharge, with the rank of flight lieutenant in October, 1945, he rejoined the Bell Company in the general commercial department for the western area at Toronto. Mr Dillane became a staff assistant in the Toronto division in October, 1947 and since February 1, 1949, he has been a manager of a group of exchanges in the company's west district office in Toronto.

LETTER TO RATEPAYERS H. and S. President Supports Addition
The Home and School Association solicit your whole-hearted support to the School Board's plans for an addition at the school. As thinking ratepayers and parents we must provide for our children now.
What mothers and fathers among us do not worry about the welfare of their families? Yet we are forced to send our young children off to school and expose them to sickness and contagion in rooms that are overcrowded in the extreme. We send them to a school with only four wash basins and toilets that were outmoded long ago. The whole building is so unsanitary that rats and flies infest the premises—small wonder that the health authorities have condemned the sanitary equipment. Yet we cannot expect this condition to improve. It can only get worse.
The proof of this lies in a census of enrolment which demonstrates that in four years the school must accommodate 524 pupils and the rooms are crowded now with their present enrolment of 380 students. Then too while we guard them against illness can we forget them from a safety point of view. Fire is an ever-present hazard in the halls and the wooden stair wells prominent in our schools. Imagine the responsibility upon the teachers to clear the rooms, to force fear-crazed children to shoot down the escape tubes or dash through the smoky hallways.
The planned additional rooms would move the smaller children to quarters which are virtually danger free and would lessen the crowding in the old school, thereby reducing the possibility of disaster.
We would also bring to your attention the nucleus of the new school addition—the auditorium or what we might call a "multi-purpose room". We must realize that yesterday's school methods are outmoded to-day. Combine with that the fact that Acton in general lacks a place where young talent can be developed and respectfully displayed. This multi-purpose room is a room for general assembly; a room where music and choir will be taught; a room for visual training aids; a room for games and physical training during inclement weather; a room for public speaking and dramatization of the children's work; a room that could provide temporary classrooms should the need ever arise; a room modern and pleasing for adults to use in the evenings for community projects.
Because our town is in dire need of additional school facilities and because the Department of Education only pays grants on approved plans, we feel this matter must receive an affirmative vote from each and all of us.
