Sewer accounts amounting to \$13,063.96 were also passed for payment.

A council committee made a report on the division of work in the municipal offices. The matter had been thoroughly discussed with the clerk and assessor and it was recommended that Clerk McGeachie have charge of the office and Mr. Crump would assist with the work in the office during the morning and he would be relieved of inspection of the installation of laterals. His duties of assessor and building inspector would be done in the afternoon. The arrangements were satisfactory to council and officials and a trial was to be made on this basis.

Council proposed the name of Dr. A. J. Buchanan as representative of the county council replacing that of G. A. Dills and the clerk was instructed to forward this information to the county clerk requesting Dr. Buchanan's appointment for next year.

The clerk reported that there would be a demonstration on November 27th of the rescuator which had been on order for some time.

Council discussed repairs that were to be made to the walk on Beaufort and Co. property which had been torn up for sewer installation.

Council expressed approval of the information that had been given them by the clerk at the joint meeting of Council and School Board and that any criticism that had been made of him was not justified but information which they felt should be available.

Reeve Tyler and Councillors Greer, Hargrave, Roszell and Hotchen were present at this meeting and Mayor A. Mason presided.

Council adjourned shortly after midnight.
