SCHOOL ADDITION FAVORED BY 4 TO 1

First Woman Is Elected To Council, Heads Polls

Over 80 per cent of Acton voters went to the polls on Monday to vote on three important matters. They gave a four to one approval of the new additions to Acton Public School, elected the first woman to Acton Council and endorsed the present Utilities Commission by three to one. The voting was unique in these three respects and also in the clear majority given to Councilors. It is quite evident that voters are pleased with the work of present officials because all were returned to office.

Checking over the voting counting eligible voters it shows that over two-thirds of those entitled on the school question cast their ballots when people get out and vote. It was also noticeable the number of spoiled ballots on all the items. When will electors learn that only crosses can be used in marking a ballot? Too many think that check marks are more suitable and these are only spoiled ballots.

Only one cross is required on the right hand side of the ballot yet some voters think they can put six crosses opposite a candidate's name and it will count six votes for him. The result is that the candidate did not get one vote when you vote observe the rules if you want your vote recorded.

In the election on Monday in Acton there were 99 spoiled ballots out of these spoiled ballots were 29 of the school question, 39 ballots were spoiled on the Public Utilities voting and 31 ballots were thrown out as spoiled on the Council election. This in spite of the fact that the walls of the polling booths were covered with clear instructions on how to mark the ballots.

Congratulate Council On Folder Issued for Acton

Acton Council members met as a Court of Revision on the 5th. They presented a report on the 1950-51 year. It was found that the Council had been successful in its efforts and that the year was up to date and had made arrangements for the future which was not complete. The house was ready for occupancy. The amount was \$12.25. The amount was up to date.

The Clerk read a letter from Acton Public School Board regarding the school question. The Council proceeded with arrangements for a large folder to be issued before the Municipal Board. It was requested that the folder be issued before the year and Chairman F. G. Dukes was pleased to discuss this with council.

Council instructed the Secretary to prepare the necessary by-law and agreed to call a special meeting to expedite the matter and prepare for replacement of the heating equipment. It was arranged for a special meeting on Tuesday morning to give readings to the by-law.

Ray Goodwin addressed council regarding the parking of his lawnmower on Mill St. He reviewed the arrangements that were made at the time the parking concession was granted. He pointed out the difficulties he had in securing a central location and the reason for the consideration of the 1949 council. He asked council to reconsider the matter.

The following resolution was passed: That Ray's Tax signs be moved further west on Mill Street down to within two car lengths of the corner signs providing that this is agreeable to all business affected by their signs.

By resolution the annual grant of the Fire Brigade for \$500 was passed for payment and the annual levy to the Board of \$500.

A letter from the Dept. of Planning and Development defined the Town of Acton as from time to time constituted as a planning area to be known as "The Town of Acton Planning Area" in accordance with Section 2 of The Planning Act 1946 as amended. The minister requested the names of the Board members and officers.

A letter from the Ohio Chemical Canada Ltd. gave information regarding a supply of cylinders of oxygen. Each cylinder costs \$2.60 and the clerk was instructed to secure six cylinders.

Foreman Kirkness reported that stone and gravel were available for west Mill Street and Cameron St. The clerk was instructed to write regarding a truck tire. Mr. Kirkness also reported the arena was ready for flooding just as soon as the weather was cold enough. He felt the present employees could handle the ice making for the start.

Letters from the Canadian Motorcraft Society and F. L. Wright were read and ordered filed.

Accounts were received for four indigent patients and the clerk was to check on these and instructions were given.

A letter was read from the county clerk regarding the appointment of a member to the North Halton High School Board.

The Department of Health forwarded their final approval for the construction of sewers in Acton. The clerk presented a list of tax arrears which amounted to \$1,000.00 (Continued on Page Five)

HITCH-HIKING "OUT"

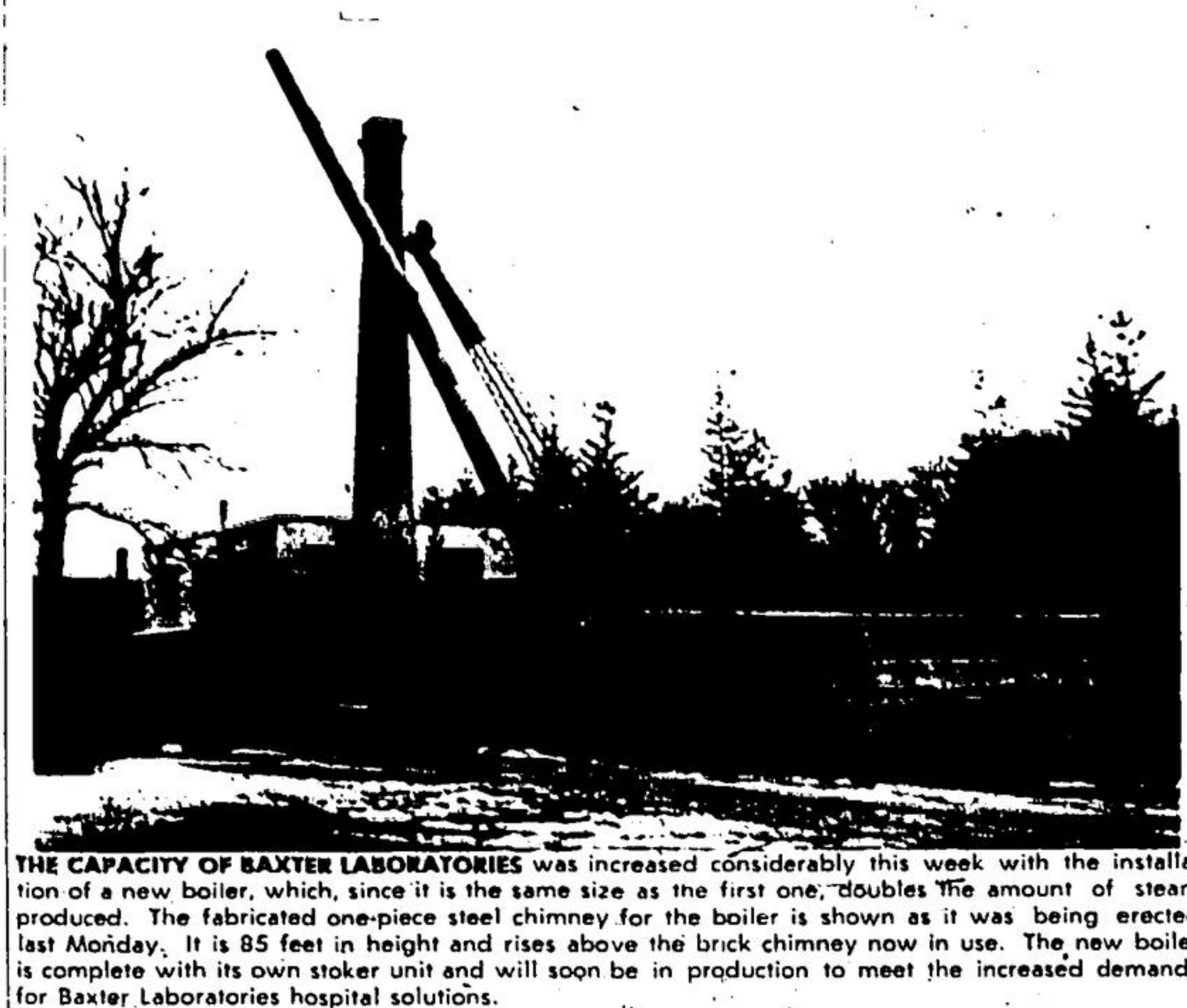

Railway Crossing Warning Signals Start Ringing, Flashing This Morning

The railway crossing signals on the Mill Street C.N.R. crossing went into operation this morning and should certainly cut down the hazard to motor traffic at this point. Yesterday we were shown part of the intricate mechanism required in this construction by Mr. A. McGeachie and his assistant, Stan Gurgacz.

Trains coming from the east will start the operation of the signals 2450 feet before the Mill Street crossing and 2050 feet on trains from the west—this is beyond the Main Street crossing. There are flasher and bell signals on the Guelph Street and railway road entrances and double flashers on each side of Mill Street. It requires eight boxes of electrical control located along the railway for the

mile of operation. In each box there are seven units which operate the mechanism. Every rail joint along the main line and three sidings had to have a wire connection. Another interesting feature of the installation is the operation of a train standing on the siding next to the main line. After 75 seconds the signals cease to operate on this standing train and do not start again until the train moves into the next area of operation. For several days the crossing was blocked while the installation was being made and the tracks were cleared, new planking and rock ballast were put in. Traffic is now back to normal but for safety's sake, obey those signals from now on!



THE CAPACITY OF BAXTER LABORATORIES was increased considerably this week with the installation of a new boiler, which, since it is the same size as the first one, doubles the amount of steam produced. The fabricated one-piece steel chimney for the boiler is shown as it was being erected last Monday. It is 85 feet in height and rises above the brick chimney now in use. The new boiler is complete with its own stoker unit and will soon be in production to meet the increased demands for Baxter Laboratories hospital solutions.
