### Conditions For Doctors and Dentists Are Found Fairly Satisfactory In the County

"What has happened to the country Doctor?" This was the topic for discussion for the first meeting of the second series of Farm Forum Radio broadcasts held Monday, Nov. 27 and it is interesting to note that out of 15 reports received from Halton Forums practically all were agreed on the first question which read as follows: "Are the Medical services in your community adequate in regard to Doctors?" Mr. Memo Forum was the only Forum which said there should be more Doctors, as rural communities are so scattered.

In regard to adequate nursing services, all agreed that there was a great scarcity of nursing services except Bell's Forum which is located close to Milton. Several suggestions were given to rectify this condition, by making training of nurses more attractive with higher pay and shorter training period. VON nursing services were also suggested.

In regard to adequate hospital services, eight Forums report hospitals are adequate, while the remainder felt they were very in-

adequate. Zimmerman suggested a County Hospital with 25 beds.

In regard to dental services, four Forums were agreed that dentists were adequate, while the remainder felt they were very inadequate and suggested that relief assistants were badly needed.

The second question was what factors in your community at present would be likely to discourage a Doctor from practicing there? Some said the twenty-four hour duty without relief and the unavoidable winter road conditions in some parts. The majority thought that there was not anything to discourage a doctor taking up practice in this locality, due to the fact that we have a Halton Co-operative Medical Service.

As to what should be done to make it more attractive for a doctor, it was thought more ready assistance could be given during the wintery weather to help the doctor reach his destination. Improved telephone service, and last but by no means least, a prepaid medical and sickness policy would encourage a doctor. Bell's Forum suggested paving Milton main street.

### Don't Leave Keys In Your Empty Car

Nine out of ten stolen cars have had the key left in the lock, reported T. E. Murphy in the Reader's Digest. Police records show that among the 400 or more cars stolen daily in the United States, 90 per cent were left on the street with the key in, "all set to go." Law-enforcement authorities are almost unanimous in believing that auto thefts could be virtually ended if the public were aware of this temptation to car thieves, and acted accordingly.

Murphy's article, condensed from the Hartford Courant Magazine, says most stolen cars are taken by youngsters. Of 19,000 persons arrested last year for auto theft, more than half were under 21, about 3,500 were under 18 and 343 were less than 15 years old. All had the same story: "I wouldn't have thought of it if I hadn't seen the key in the car."

Although many laws bar ignition keys in unattended cars, such laws are largely ignored. Illustrating how strict enforcement can reduce automobile thefts is the case of Decatur, Ill. In 1945, alarmed by an epidemic of car stealings, Decatur's authorities decided to enforce a law that had been "lying dormant on the books." Forty-one persons were arrested in the first two months for leaving keys in their cars. In the following six months not a car was stolen in the city.

Other municipalities have reduced car thefts not by enacting laws but by educating the public, through warning signs and booklets, in the danger of leaving a parked car with a key in it.
