—Election results were the main topic of conversation for everyone Monday night and Tuesday.

—Over two-thirds of those eligible to vote registered their wishes on the question of the addition to the public school.

—Last classes of the three leatherwork groups are being held this week at the Y. The ladies then adjourn until after Christmas.

—Machinery from the Wool Combing Corporation of Canada's nylon division was moved to Gall on Monday to the new plant there.

—It has just been announced this week that the King will make his usual Christmas broadcast at 3 p.m. London time or 10 a.m. our time on Christmas Day.

—Rev. T. G. M. Bryant of Duff's Church, Morrison and Rev. Robert H. Armstrong, M.A. of Knox Church here exchanged pulpits last Sunday morning.

—Potential skating champions will further their Barbara Ann Scott ambitions by being careful so early in the skating season. Fairy Lake could prove treacherous.

—The fire alarm on Monday evening summoned the firemen to MacSwain's Garage. The chimney fire they found there was quickly brought under control and caused very little damage.

—About 100 Acton residents voted on the members of Council and Hydro Commissioner on Monday. According to the Voters' List there were 1470 eligible to vote. The percentage is about 60.

—The Firemen's Ball at the town hall last Friday night was quite a success. The winners of the \$5, \$3 and \$2 cash prizes were Fred, Bill and Bob, Acton, second, George Edwards, Acton, and third, Joe Roberts, Campbellville.

—Thirty friends of Mr. and Mrs. John C. Dennis gathered for a surprise visit at their home one evening last week to honor them on their 25th wedding anniversary. A beautiful silver dish was presented to them as a memento of the occasion.

—Much inconvenience has been caused by broken water mains in different places in town since the fire inspection Tuesday. Repairmen under Superintendent of Waterworks Lambert are working with all possible speed to rectify the damage.

—Boy Scout paper collection this Saturday. The Scouts ask that old papers be tied in bundles and that a red paper collection sign be displayed clearly in homes where there is paper to be gathered. Red signs are available at the Free Press office for those who do not have one.

—There were 99 spoiled ballots that had to be discarded when the election results were being tabulated on Monday. With checks instead of X's, the X in the wrong place or any other type of mark that might distinguish one voter from another, the votes could not be included in the count.

—Peter Krecklewich of the Acton Provincial Police spotted a stolen car driving through town last Tuesday night. He gave chase in the cruiser but blew a tire in Rockwood. Unable to follow any longer, he radioed Guelph police to set up a road block. The car was the stolen one and the driver was apprehended.

—Following the trial run of the Acton fire brigade ordered by the Fire Underwriters' Association Tuesday afternoon the fire truck drove down to the pond and further tested its equipment by pumping water from the pond for about 20 minutes. The inspector spent the afternoon with Fire Chief Fred Dawkins.

—An announcement sent to Acton Y this week states that John M. Pritchard, President of the National Council of the Y.M.C.A. of Canada, has just been appointed vice-chairman of the North American Y.M.C.A. Centennial Committee Celebrations marking the 100th anniversary of the Y.M.C.A. in North America will be held next June in Cleveland Ohio. Ten thousand delegates from the Y.M.C.A. of this continent are expected.

District Delegate To Music Clinic

Miss Margaret McDougall of S. S. No. 2 Esquimaux was among the band and orchestra directors attending the Third Annual Instrumental Music Clinic held in Toronto on Saturday, November 25th.

This unique Canadian event provided an opportunity for music directors to hear and discuss music suitable for school and community bands and orchestras. The clinic which was sponsored by the Faculty of Music of the University of Toronto, was directed by Professor Robert A. Rosevear of the School Music Course staff. Assisting in the administration were University students who are preparing to teach music in the secondary schools.

Karl D. VanHoesen, supervisor of instrumental music for the Rochester, New York schools and member of the faculty of the Eastman School of Music, acted as guest conductor. The clinic orchestra was made up of senior members of the North Toronto Collegiate Institute Orchestra, Jack M. Dow, director and the Barrie Collegiate Institute Band, W. Allen Fisher, director.

Musicians from the Province of Quebec and New York State were among the visitors present at the clinic. Many Ontario instrumental teachers and directors were in attendance with cities as far as Windsor and Cobourg being represented.

The wide interest in a laboratory of instrumental music such as this, indicates the increasing interest in this field of music throughout Canada and shows that there will be many capable musicians ready to direct this Canadian endeavor.
