**Taste Panels Tell  
Results of Recipes**

Junior's jam covered chin is due for a clean up. Mothers can lay away the sticky facecloth fathers can now read unstuck newspaper pages, thanks to the efforts of the Department of Agriculture's Consumer Section, where various recipes for home made jam remove some of the domestic dangers associated with loose running jam and make it behave on the "home front".

Many problems confront the busy housewife from day to day and some of these are introduced with some of the newer methods of preparing food that Grandmother never even dreamt about. How, for instance, should string beans be treated before freezing and should apple pies be baked or unbaked before being placed in the home freezing unit? What is the best method of pickling eggs, and is there more food value in a white shelled-egg than in one with that sun-tan look? These and thousands of other questions are all in the day's work for the trained home economists in Consumer Section, all busily engaged in "Canada's Kitchen" testing recipes and different methods of food preservation for family use.

Working on the principle that the "proof of the pudding is in the eating," no recipe is released until it has been carefully tested for taste by a panel of experts. Various specialists in Consumer Section (or from outside) are called in to sit on the taste panel and pass judgment on the merits of the finished product. Each judge makes a report independent of the other, scoring it on a special form provided for the purpose. Should more than one recipe be included on the taste panel water is used to remove the taste of one before proceeding on to the next.

"Don't guess, buy by grade" is the watchword of the home economists in Consumer Section whose primary concern is to provide the Canadian public with reliable information on the buying and the efficient utilization of foods produced on farms in Canada from coast to coast. Information is sent out not only on preparing meals, but pointers are given on how best to buy on a food value basis. This is done by weekly press and radio releases, illustrated lectures and addresses, exhibits at fairs and conferences and various consumer bulletins and pamphlets that are available on request.

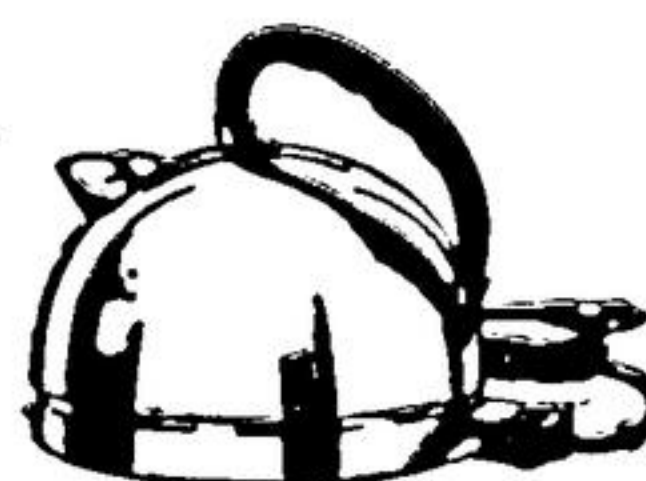

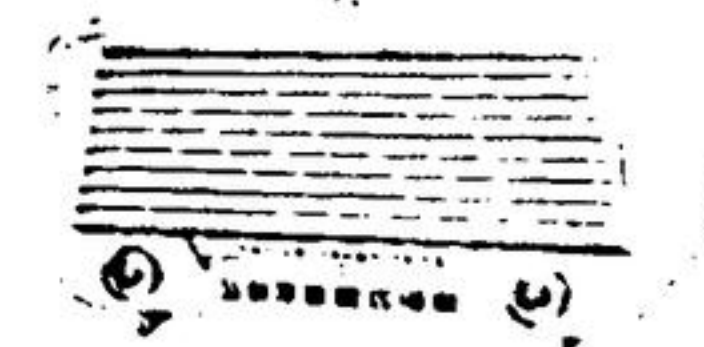

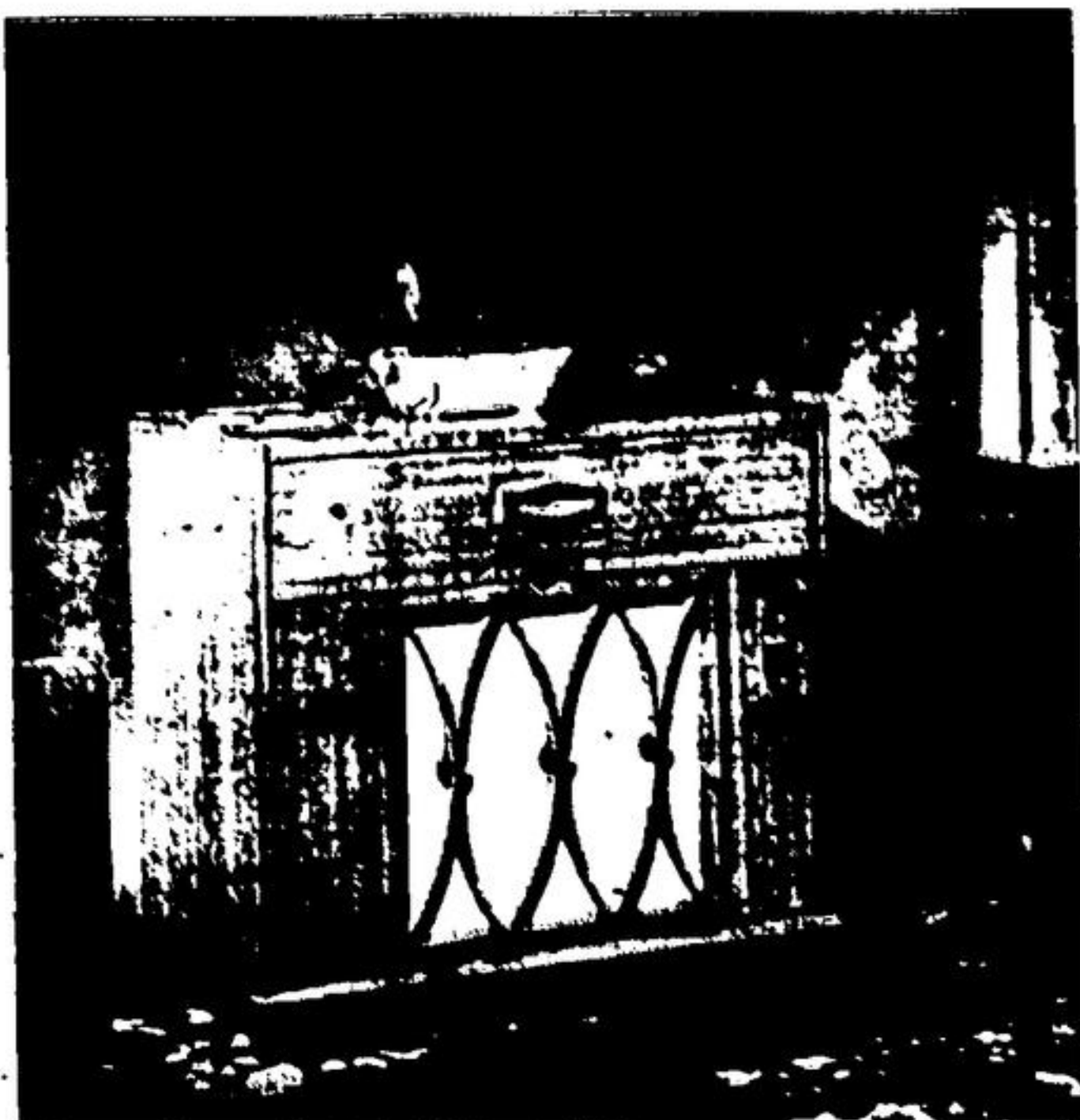
