Unions For Farm Labour Impractical
In Halton, Most Farm Forums Decide

When Farm Forums listened to
Monday night's broadcast over
CBLE at 8:30 they heard a dramatized
discussion on "Security for
Farm Labour." Four Forums decided

labor not advisable in Canada. The
scarcity of farm laborers in
Canada gives them the opportunity
to choose good places to work with
satisfactory working conditions
without unions. (D) If farm unions
get too strong, a farmer would
have to employ a man whether he
was any good or not. If farmers
themselves were unionized their
farm labourers could be otherwise
the farmers would be in the
unions power too much. (d) Farmers
cannot control the price of their
products, therefore their incomes
are uncertain and they cannot
guarantee hired help a definite
wage.


Zimmerman claimed farmers can
not pay wages demanded by organ-
ized labor. Farmers cannot compete
against the exorbitant prices paid
in industry and the wide distribution
of labor. There are not enough
people in the farm labour groups
in one place to make it practical.
