Review Federation Benefit to Farmers

Farmers have a machine to build economic stability for their industry if they will only use it, said Vivian Milburn, Secretary of the Ontario Federation of Agriculture, addressing the annual meeting of Halton County Federation in the Town Hall Monday. Mr. Milburn gave a resume of the year's activities, remarking that there had been a good deal of fear and uncertainty when it became evident that our export markets were in danger.
