### Moffat Soldier Believed In Korea

Private John Keith Robertson, 21, the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Robertson Moffat is believed to be in Korea or on route there from Japan. He is a graduate of Nassagaweya Township public schools and Milton high school. Before enlisting last August in Toronto, he was employed with the International Nickel Co. at Sudbury.

Private Robertson went directly to Calgary with the 2nd Battalion of the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry for training and spent two weeks' leave at home in October. Further training was given him at Wainwright, Alberta and just a few weeks ago the regiment set sail from Seattle to Japan. It was announced that these troops would go directly into Korea rather than complete their training elsewhere. His father, Jack Robertson, is a former Nassagaweya Township Councillor. A married sister, Mrs. Clare Pemberton, lives in Guelph.

### Power Cost To Rise Jan. 1st — Hydro

A letter was received from the H.E.P.C. of Ontario at the regular meeting of Acton Public Utilities Commission, Tuesday evening, which stated that the per kilowatt cost of power to Acton would be increased to \$0.60 as of January 1. This is an increase of \$1.10 per kilowatt. This will amount to about \$400 per month for the power bill.

Another letter from the H.E.P.C. of Ontario gave the cost of power supplied to the Waterworks Department and also to the fire lighting service. There is a surcharge from the waterworks operation for the street lighting, how- ever, and an overall deficit of considerable amount.

Two motions were passed transferring monies from the Waterworks Department to that of the Corporation. One amount was \$3,000 and a temporary transfer was also made of \$1,500.

A motion was passed offering H. Palmer \$17 per month for care taking services as of January 1st, 1951.

The Utilities renewed its membership in the Waterworks Association.

Hydro superintendent Mason was instructed to purchase a testing meter for the installation of dem and meters and to also check on a wall testing meter which the Commission had ordered purchased.

Waterworks superintendent Lamb reported that there were 18 leaks caused by the high pressure on the water mains. All but one of these leaks have now been repaired. Cost of repairing the repairs have not as yet been computed.

Superintendent Lamb also reported that the new boiler had been installed east of the C. N. R. tracks. The main on Church St. was being installed and it was expected they would be completed this week. The service pipes were not installed at the time of the main but would be installed later.

Superintendent Mason reported that Kerwin McPhail who was injured some time ago had the cast removed from his foot last week. X-ray showed that the break had not properly healed and another cast was put on his foot.

The Commission discussed the extra charge levied by the Council on the water rates. This new rate goes into effect with the first billing in January. It was felt by some members that a joint meeting should be held with council before any of the new charges should be billed as no agreement had been made with council for setting up a special account for sewers.
