Suggest Safe Way For Starting Fires

In starting fires in the most common types of stoves and heaters the National Board of Underwriters suggests that these steps be followed: 1. Remove all ashes and partly burned fuel from the grate and ashpit. Clean the stove thoroughly. 2. Open the damper. 3. Using a metal container, bring in the coal and wood. Place it on the metal pad beneath the stove. That metal pad is important — if you don't have one, now is a good time to get one. 4. Twist several sheets of newspaper together and bend them in the shape of a horseshoe. Place them in the combustion chamber and put dry kindling on top of the paper. 5. Light the fire from underneath. 6. Shut the ashpit door and partially close the side openings. Open the draft in the ashpit door. 7. After the fire has started, place several large pieces of wood in the stove and cover them with several shovelfuls of coal.
