## OBITUARY

### Good Works Follow Mrs. Ruth Antliff

The United Church Observer of January 18th carries an obituary of Mrs. Ruth C. Antliff. Mrs. Antliff was the wife of the late Rev. J. C. Antliff, D.D., who was the minister of Acton United Church for several years.

The report read as follows: "Mrs. Antliff, a life member of the W.M.S. of the Dominion-Douglas Church, Westmount, Que., passed away quietly November 4th, 1950. A daughter of the late Rev. W. J. Shaw, D.D., she married a son of the late Rev. J. C. Antliff, D.D., and was left a widow when her three sons were very young. She held various offices in her own auxiliary and in the Montreal Presbytery.

She followed her mother in the administrative work of the Syrian Mission, the Italian Mission and of the French Protestant Home, which later became the Children's Home at Lachine. She was on the Advisory Board of the French Institute at Pointe aux Trembles, and was a member of the advisory committee of the Dominion Board, taking special interest in the Lachine Home, where her good judgment was greatly valued. She did outstanding work as a treasurer of the Montreal Presbytery, being the originator of the yearly financial statement used today.

She was an indefatigable worker in the W.A., where her skill and ability contributed much to the success of the work.

She has joined the noble army of those who, after a life-time of good works, "Rest from their labours, and their good works do follow them."
