Juveniles Drop Decision To Fergus In First Play-off

Acton Juveniles will have to overcome a four goal deficit when they meet Fergus tonight in the second game of a two-game total goal series for the right to advance into the group-finals against the winners of the Georgetown-Elmira play-off. The Acton club dropped the first game here on Tuesday night by a 10-6 count and this virtually eliminated them from the running. Their chances of overcoming the Fergus lead are very slim unless they pull up their socks and play better hockey than they have to date.

Although they literally pushed Fergus off the ice in the second period of Tuesday's game, scoring five goals which enabled them to carry a 5-4 lead into the final chapter, Acton blew the duke. In the third period, Fergus romped for six goals to a solitary reply from Acton—a solo effort by Vaughan.

Perhaps it was lack of condition or it may have been the ice, but Acton just didn't have the spirit it takes to win games. Aside from two or three of the better players, Vaughan, Wilshire and Bill Hutt, the team couldn't keep pace with the smart passing Fergus club in the third period. On several of the Fergus goals, the Acton defence in desperate clearing manures passed pucks directly to Fergus players parked in front of the Acton net. All they had to do was shoot.

Old "Swifty" Mason directed the visitors from the bench and he was hardly any more pleased than the Acton fans at the antics of the referee from Fergus. The game was embellished by two or three decisions that were highly questionable.

Baxters Keep Lead In First Shut-Out
