Mr. Fred L. Wright was named First Vice-President of the Toronto Chapter, Appraisers Institute for Canada, at a meeting in Toronto last week.

At the special World Day of Prayer service in Georgetown's Knox Church, Mrs. Cameron Leishman of Acton was the guest soloist.

Chirping gaily that he was glad he could fly and didn't have to walk on the icy roads, a robin was seen on Tuesday morning by Mrs. Bill Thompson, Wilbur St.

Professor Robertson, who founded the biology department of the University of Western Ontario, died suddenly at his home in London on Monday, Feb. 12. Mrs. Robt. VanNorman of Acton is his sister.

There were quite a few minor accidents on Tuesday morning when roads, sidewalks and steps were all a sheet of ice. It took one carload two hours to get from Acton to Milton, and other vehicles were in similar predicaments.

Tuesday morning a sanding truck went in the ditch on No. 25 highway between Acton and Milton. It was pulled out by another truck loaded with bricks. Sanders were finding it necessary to back down hills, the roads were so icy.

When the thaw began to react on the sidewalks that had not been shovelled of snow on Monday, walking was a treacherous occupation. A misstep would be fatal and boots and rubbers were placed gingerly on the ice beneath puddles.

Wolves have been reported running in packs in the district between Acton and Rockwood and they have destroyed stock on at least one farm. Conservation officer Gordon Matthews said that an organized wolf hunt may be held in the Creswon's Corners area soon.

Many cases of measles are reported in the county. This week there were 81 cases reported to the Halton County Health Unit, with 50 of them in Burlington and 23 in Georgetown. In Milton 3 cases were reported, 1 in Trafalgar Township and 4 in Nassagaweya Township. No cases were reported in Acton.

## TRUCK TRAVELS 100 FEET, HITS POSTS AFTER LEAVING 25 HIGHWAY

Damage was estimated at about \$75 to a truck owned by the Gilsom Manufacturing Co. of Guelph when it went off the side of the road on No. 25 highway just north of the Mountain school about 4:30 in the afternoon last Thursday, February 8th.

Traveling towards Acton from Milton, the driver of the truck, Edward Carroll of Guelph, edged the truck to the extreme right of the highway to avoid a car coming onto the highway on the other side. The vehicle went over the edge of the pavement and travelled about 100 feet before it came to a stop, breaking two guard posts.

The car driven by Mr. W. J. Fox of Esqueping Township, was coming down the road north of the school which joins the highway at a sharp angle. He had made a wide turn in order to drive toward Milton.

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**TOWN OF ACTON**

BY-LAW No. 934

a by-law to amend by-law No. 738 as amended by by-law No. 908, being a by-law to tax, restrain and regulate the running at large of dogs within the municipality of the Town of Acton

The Municipal Council of the Town of Acton under and by virtue of the Dog Tax and Livestock Protection Act, R.S.O. 1950 Chapter 107, and amendments thereto, enacts as follows:

(1) Section (5a) is hereby added to Paragraph Four of By-law No. 738.

4. (5a) Every person who permits his dog to run at large between sundown on Sunday afternoon and sundown on Monday afternoon, and between sundown on Wednesday afternoon and sundown on Thursday afternoon shall be liable to a fine not exceeding the sum of TEN DOLLARS (\$10.00) at the discretion of the Justice of the Peace and any dog so found in treatment as in the preceding clause.

Read a first, second and third time and passed in Council on Nineteenth day of January, 1951
