The Municipal Council of the Town of Acton under and by victue of the Dog Tax and Livestock Protection Act. R.S.O. 1950 Chapter 107, and amendments thereto. enacts as follows:

(1) Section (5a) is hereby added to Paragraph Four of By-law

4. (5a) Every person who permits his dog to run at large between sundown on Sunday afternoon and sundown on Monday afternoon, and between sundown Wednesday afternoon and sundown on Thursday afternoon shall the sum of TEN DOLLARS (\$10.00) at the discretion of the Justice of to treatment as in the preceding clause.
