### Writer Raps Costs; For "Square Deal"

Mr:-G. A. Dilla. Editor and Publisher The Acton Free Press. Dear Sir:

Over a year ago our binndowner citizens decided by a vote to put in a rewerage disposal system and to day we have that system-in, but I understand-that-due to the present world conditions we have not been able to complete the sewerage disposal plant. Some of the necessary items are at present unavailableand world conditions, as you notice, are not improving. Of course, this system must be paid for, we all understand that.

But here is what I cannot understand; only the landowner could vote on the question of sewers, and how many fund owners have, are or even intend to connect up that 104 system to those who live in their homes? He does not have to, yet in some cases rent will be raised Why?-"Well, you know, sewers of

I have been told that a by-law tos. " Day-passed\_ compelling every house to be connected to or with the sewers. When? The reply was "Oh, in a year or so".

But our council passes a by-law doubling the water rates, the extra on the water rate is called sewerage disposal system rental, so the tenant has to pay to put in his Inndford's sewer system, and I am coming out plainly and asking "Who is protecting who?"

A by-law has been passed, ap- 1. proval has been obtained from the Municipal Board. But, I ask this, "Since when have our Canadian laws been altered to permit rental to be paid on anything that they have not got?" With the high cost of living today, including high rentals, rents are just about as high here as in Toronto, in some cases higher. The rent for a house is set according to the shape it is in, but not in Acton. Of course, 'Acton comes under the Hamilton division of rental control, not Toronto, and

that does make a difference. But a man, with four or five children, who lives on "Acton wages", well I'll bet that he has to run a very tight budget. Seemingly the town is not concerned if a man is making enough wages or not, as long as he is not making too much. I don't kick so much on what I have to pay, but I certainly do-kick-on-paying for what-I-don't get. Is that justice? Is that democracy? Many in Acton fought for freedom for others and for other nations; but they don't get it at home. Oh yes, I know that there is no such a person as a veteran or a returned man now-that is in

I hope Mr. Dills that you will have space for this letter in your paper, to publish as written. Of course, it will give those people, who have before, and will again, say how stupid I am. Sure I am. and I shalf always be stupid as far as fighting for a square deal goes.
