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

In order to reduce the numbers of deer legally, the Department of Lands and Forests has had open seasons in Townships. Sixteen Townships had an open season in the Huron District in the fall of 1950. If wildlife such as deer is doing damage, they will give a permit to shoot the deer but the meat has to be turned overd to a chari-, table institution. In the case of beaver, a permit is issued to trap them or the beaver are live-trapped and placed at a location where

they won't do any harm. An open season throughout all of Southern Ontario has been advocated and it seems as if it might be the logical answer to the problem.
