Dr. Sutherland, director of Wellington County Health Unit was present as guest speaker, his subject being "Relation of sanitation to school health." The doctor brought out many good points to help safeguard our children's health and showed where the school and building could be improved to do this with regard to the water supply, lighting, heating, ventilation, plumbing, covered receptacle for garbage, paper drinking cups and liquid soap. A vote of thanks was voted to the speaker for his informative address.
