# Tender Accepted By PUC Four Suffer Cuts, Damage Is \$1400 For New Half-Ton Truck

At the regular meeting of the Acton Public Utilities Commission last Tuesday evening, it was decided to buy a half-ton pick-up truck for the Waterworks Department from Thompson Motors. Present at the meeting were Reeve E. Tyler, Commissioner J. T. Ware and Chairman J. R. MacArthur.

Three tenders were submitted, Garner Motors, for a G.M.C. true at a cost of \$1,372, with 16.-6.00 six-ply tires; MacSwain Motors, a Fargo truck for \$1,365 with 16.-6.00 four-ply tires; and Thompson Motors. Ford truck for \$1,380 with 6.50-18 six-ply tires and 10c per letter for inscribing the name on the doors.

Good Friday was certainly good duy. Pte. Robertson boarded a plane that same day - Barbara Ann Scott shared part of the trip - and arrived in Toronto on Saturday. The entire trip home from Tokyo, Japan to Malton airport, took only 46 hours.

From Toronto the young soldier called, surprising his family and they set out immediately to meet him. That evening the whole family spent together, Keith, his sister, Mrs. Clare Pembleton of Guelph, his younger brother Paul and their parents.

Now, after a very happy Easter week-end, Pte. Robertson is at Sunnybrook Hospital, Toronto, receiving treatment for his injured eye. He is not sure how long he will be there.

He was wounded when the Princess Pats were attacking a Communist stronghold on a high hill, A rifleman, he had only been in action a week when wounded. Shrapnel hit his left shoulder and left eye. He believes he was hit after a bullet ricocheted from a stone and split.

He was flown to a U. S. base hospital in Tokyo and then was transferred to a British base hospital. Present treatment at Sunnybrook Hospital is in hopes that he will be able to regain . the use of his eye. One American doctor told him there was definitely some hope.

Pte. Robertson attended publicschool in Nassagaweya and then Milton High School. For three years he worked with the International Nickel Co. at . Sudbury. Last August he joined the Princess Patricias and trained at Wainwright, Alberta and then Fort Lewis. Tall and quiet, Kelth Robertson spent his 21st birthday in
