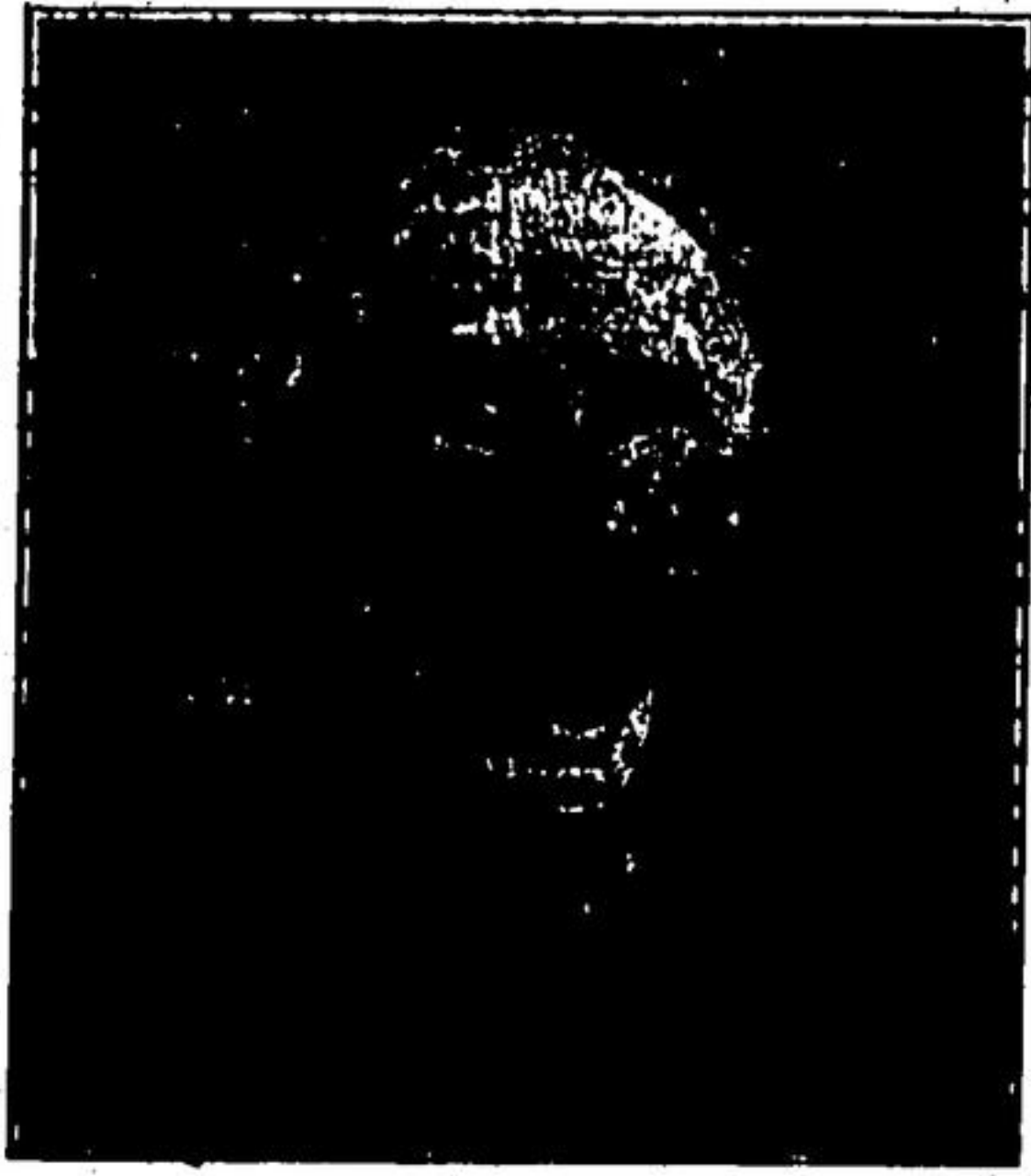

High School Pupils Have Free X-Rays

Through the co-operation of the Ontario Department of Health the Halton County Health and Tuberculosis Association and the Halton County Health Unit, free chest X-rays are being offered to all high school students in Halton county.

A mobile clinic from the Provincial Department of Health will visit the high schools in Acton, Burlington, Georgetown and Milton. In Oakville, the students will have their X-rays done in the Oakville-Trafalgar Memorial Hospital where through a federal health grant, special X-ray equipment was installed when the hospital was built.

The routine X-rays of chests of high school students is a most important part of the program for the control of tuberculosis. It is in the teenage group, with its rapid growth and maturation, that tuberculosis may easily become established.

Ontario has the lowest death rate from tuberculosis in the world. This routine, periodic X-ray of high school students is just one of the methods by which this happy state has been attained.

X-ray dates are as follows: Milton High School, April 3rd, 9:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. Acton High School, April 3rd, 3:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m.
