

High School Pupils Tender Accepted The thanks of the Committee was Have Free X-Rays

Through the co-operation of the Halton County Health and Tuberculosis Association and the Halton rays are being offered to all high school students in Halton county. This has been made possible by the purchase of Christmas seals by the people of Halton county.

A mobile clinic from the Provincial Department of Health will visit the high schools in Acton, Burlington, Georgetown and Milton. In Oakville, the students will have their X-rays done in the Oakville-Trafalgar Memorial Hospital where special X-ray equipment was in-This special X-ray equipment is used for chest X-rays of all patients admitted to hospital. This is done in a constant, never-ending search for early cases of tubercu-

It is in the teen-age group, with its rapid growth and maturation, that tuberculosis may easily become established.
