

Mrs. A. Desserault protested the cutting of a maple tree which was five feet from her property on Young Street. It was said the tree was sound and her property was affected by its removal. She asked who was going to recompense her for the loss of the tree. It was requested that the tree stump be Pe-M. on Monday evening on the oc- moved, two new trees be planted and awnings be provided for the windows on her home.

It appears the removal of the treon Peel Street was recommended by the Hydro officials of the Public Utilities Commission and this was passed at a meeting on recommendation last fall. The Commission had taken the removal of three trees up with council at this time. The poles on the street had been moved back and if this tree had been left and trimmed it would have left two limbs overhanging the property and would have been dangerous. The workmen who made the removal were under contract of the Commission.

The following resolution was passed: "That the road committee investigate with the Hydro and if the planting of two trees will not interfere later with Hydro that the two trees will be planted to replace the tree cut down on Peel Street or if not possible on Peel Street at any suitable spot designated by Mrs.
