Hello Homemakers! We know you will clip this column as soon as you find the scissors. The recipes are cookies that require no cooking. Perhaps this is the time to start a new section in your file and label. Untasted Cookies. Clip these recipes and write or paste them on 3 by 5 inch cards.

Just one reminder in regard to these mixtures: Chill them in the refrigerator to maintain the flavor of each ingredient.

**Date Rolls**  
1 lb. dates  
4 cup figs  
4 cup raisins  
1 cup coconut  
Spread 1 cup coconut in pan and brown delicately. Chop dates, figs and raisins, mix and form rolls. Roll in browned coconut.

**Whole Wheat Puffs**  
Whole wheat wafers  
Marshmallow topping  
Maraschino cherries  
Brazil nuts  
Drop a small spoonful of marshmallow topping on whole wheat or digestive biscuits. Sprinkle with silvered Brazil nuts and top with a half maraschino cherry on each. Chill.

**Creamed Fruits**  
24 marshmallows, cut  
4 lb. maraschino cherries  
1 cup chopped walnuts  
2 cups chopped dates  
1 tin evaporated milk  
1 flat box graham wafers  
Clip marshmallows. Drain cherries and cut. Mix marshmallows, cherries, walnuts, dates. Stir in graham wafer crumbs and milk alternately into fruit. Form mix into balls and roll in a few wafer crumbs. Chill.

**Peanut Butter Pats**  
1 cup peanut butter  
1 cup icing sugar  
4 cup nuts, chopped  
4 cup dates, chopped  
Mix all ingredients thoroughly. Pat into small cakes and sprinkle with fine granulated sugar. Chill in electric refrigerator.

**Sandies**  
3 cup whipping cream  
1 cup chopped walnuts  
1 cup chopped dates  
12 marshmallows, cut small  
12 graham wafers, rolled  
Whip cream until stiff. Add marshmallows and let stand in electric refrigerator 1 hour. Then add dates, nuts and 4 tbsps. wafer crumbs. Drop a teaspoonful of mixture at a time in remaining cream and form balls. Store in refrigerator until needed.

**Ginger Farm**

Snowdrops in bloom; maple trees budding; robins in a tree-top; warm sunshine; ruby-red rhubarb sprouts—yes, and even a few swamp frogs singing. I think it must be spring! And isn't it grand? I even found one stalk of asparagus. We didn't have it for dinner.

Of course with all these positive signs farmers are beginning their plans for getting out on the land. And farmers' wives have a feeling it is surely safe now to start house-cleaning.

The shade is showing an encouraging whet of green; and the clover well, we are not quite sure yet, how good the clover may turn out to be. But "hope springs eternal" because a good clover crop is like money in the bank to the farmer.

It is wonderful not to have the mud to contend with any more—but now its dust. Dust blowing in clouds along the highway because the grader has been busy getting the road in shape again for the continuation of the paving job that was interrupted last fall by the heavy snowfall of the season. It is going to be wonderful to drive down the lane on to a nice smooth highway. However that won't be for a little while yet as the construction gang has two concessions to go before they get down this far.

We expected visitors this weekend but plans were changed so they didn't arrive. By next week it should be even more spring-like—and maybe by that time I shall have few more spiders and cobwebs chased out of their winter quarters. The bright spring sunshine is terribly revealing.

We have another new calf at the barn—arrived yesterday morning. Our cows have been most considerate since we have been farming alone. Every cow that freshened had her calf during daylight hours so that it has not been necessary for Partner to make late trips to the barn to make sure the expectant mother was not in difficulties. Neither has it been necessary to call in a "vet" for any of them. Some of you may remember that last spring I reported the arrival of identical twin heifer calves, which we kept. They are still as prettily marked by a long way as they have about as many spots as a leopard. Instead of big reddish-brown patches on white the way Ayrshires are usually marked: it will be quite impossible to tell one from the other when they get out on grass—unless they develop individual characteristics, which is more than likely. Even in a small herd there is always one cow or heifer who is always the first to discover a weak place in a fence or the gate that has been accidentally left open. Then comes the favourite game of all cattle, whatever the breed—the game of "follow your leader!"

Well, as I just mentioned, the cows haven't kept us up at night at all. But something else has. Hockey, no less! Not local hockey because we are not able to get out to follow the games, but National Hockey on the radio. Partner just couldn't miss a broadcast. And I like to listen to them too—although I must admit I sometimes fall asleep between periods. But I always wake up again with Foster Hewitt's "the shoots—he scores!" Like most people we get somewhat fed up when there is too much rough stuff, resulting in an aftermath of penalties. But on the whole the hockey broadcast provides an evening of good entertainment without leaving one's own fireside.

So much for radio... I wonder what would happen if we had television and whether we shall ever change our mind about wanting a set. Could be because I remember the time when one thing we didn't want was a radio! Now we think of it as one of the essentials of daily living. And when they cost so little why be without one? But over \$400 for a TV set? Well, we haven't got that kind of money. And after the budget is brought down next Tuesday who knows what they will cost?
