THE OLD MAN OF THE BIG CLOCK TOWER

For many years the present and the former editor of the Free Press, the late H. P. Moore, wrote under the drawing alongside this item of Acton recollections. "The Old Man" column was a familiar one to our readers.

Occasionally we like to reminisce a little but not to the extent of a column of news each week. Recently we wrote a little item about Acton's time signals and the changes.

It's been a delight to us to note the restoration of the town clock striking and recall that our boyhood school mate, Cam Leishman shares with us these recollections and arranged to have the clock restored to striking order. It shows us how folks of like age have so much in common.

Our thanks for the restoration of one of Acton's time signals that we have found were perhaps not necessary but maintain a link in tradition of older days when the Clock Tower was such a fine place to note Acton recollections.

Just thinking that in the twelve years since the Clock Tower article has been absent from these columns, there have been a lot of changes. Acton's population in those years was under 2000 while now it's over 3000. Places that were farm fields are now new housing subdivisions. New factories have opened up with new products being made. A second World War has been fought and we stand on the brink of another.
