Survey Of Highway Proves Tough Job

Surveying parties are to begin work this week along the proposed routes of the Toronto-Windsor highway. University students are being employed for the job. A secondary route between Acton and Milton will be among those surveyed.

Traffic surveys have been taken of all major country and township roads to ascertain which are in most need of a highway. The volume of traffic in this area evidently warranted the proximity of a new highway even though the stretch of land between Toronto and Paris is already causing some concern due to the Niagara Esplanade. It is because of this that preliminary surveys of the area are necessarily taking considerable time.

The traffic surveys of all of Ontario have been taken with the exception of the Brantford area and some of the route of the new highway near London. The highway will certainly be a boon in this district where No. 7 highway is not congested but is always busy in the day time. For industry and farm sales the quicker route to Toronto will be an asset.
