Hot Trip For Huge 1700 Degree Ingot

Believed to be the first of its kind, an experiment was completed successfully recently when a 30,000 pound hot alloy ingot was shipped nearly 200 miles between Sydney and Trenton, N.S., by Canadian National Railways. 'Using special arrangements for shipment, the huge ingot was allowed to solidify in a mould, then was stripped and placed in a cast-fron box insulated with a pre-moulded vermiculite and securely fastened and braced to the floor of the railway car.

The experiment resulted in the speeding-up of the processing by nearly two months. Previously. the ingot required six weeks to cool prior to shipment and following delivery, needed another ten days for reheating. Othere features of transporting hot ingots are the elimination of danger of cracking the ingot and a considerable reduction processing costs. So efficient were
