enough for the required stoves and installation of the wire would be too costly. They were entitled to use the town hall in its present form.

Permit was granted the Girls' Softball Association to use the softball diamond in the park on Monday evenings during the summer.

Repairs were asked on some sidewalk sections broken at the time of sewerage installation. Town sidewalks were to be repaired in the near future according to council.

The Road Committee was instructed to investigate the use of boards left in sidewalks for drainage purposes. Council felt broken and missing boards were a hazard to pedestrians.

As the town share of 20 per cent. taxes collected from beer outlets in the municipality \$816.18 was paid by the Liquor Control Board.

Council agreed to pay half the cost of repairing the Winfield fence fronting on Acton Park at a cost to the clerk of \$4.00.

The clerk reported that telephone poles on Agnes St. would be moved. The recent opening and widening of Agnes St. from Willow to Main St. made the move necessary since they are now in the centre of the widened road.

Peter Federko submitted a bill for digging a lateral which was not the required depth at the property line. It was turned over to the Spartan Contracting Co.

A letter from the Library Board thanked council for the increased grant and expressed a hope that they would be able to provide good books for Acton.
