pumping station of the sewage plant on Agnes St.

As the council is making plans for the resurfacing of both Mill and Main Streets, it was felt all old water services should be renewed before the permanent top is laid. There are approximately twenty-five water services which are not copper or lead. The Commission decided that these services should be renewed now and Secretary J. McGeachie was instructed to write all consumers involved stating the plans of the Commission. The property owners must bear the cost of these new installations from the curb shut-offs to the building while the Commission assumes the cost from the mains to the shut-offs as in other parts of the town.

In viewing the new sewage pumping station it was felt a manhole in the roof would greatly facilitate the removal and repair of machinery. This request was to be made to the engineer.

The bill for the broken hydrant which was moved last week is to be sent to Spartan Construction as it is reported the contractors hit the hydrant when installing sewers.

The Commission agreed to Supt. Lambert's suggestion that the service pipe on John St. N. be renewed at this time.

Hydro Superintendent D. Mason was instructed to procure prices and estimates on the installation of light standards and underground wiring in the two main business blocks. As soon as these services are located, casements are to be procured for running the wires at the rear of the street to eliminate all poles between Main and John streets on Mill street.

The Commission agreed to meet on Thursday evening at the water tank with a view of planting flowers and shrubs on the property.

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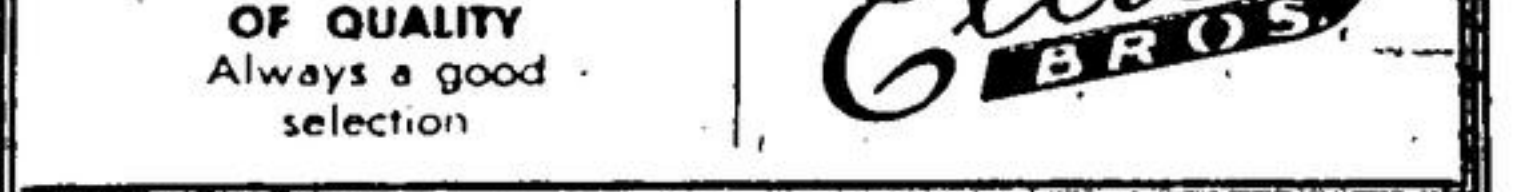
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
