**ERIN TOWNSHIP**  
 BY-LAW NO. 5, 1951  
**A By-law to amend By-law No. 7, 1949, for the purpose of licensing Dogs under the Dog-tax and Live Stock Protection Act, R.S.O. Chapter 335, 1937, and the Dog-tax and Live Stock Protection Amendment Act of 1947.**  
**A By-law for the purpose of licensing all dogs owned, harbored or possessed by the assessed owner, or owners, tenant or tenants, and including any party and all parties residing in the assessed household of any premises within the Municipality of the Township of Erin in accordance with the above paragraph.**  
 Be it therefore and is hereby enacted that all dogs enumerated on any one premises (other than they that possess a Kennel License) shall be licensed as per the following schedule namely:  
 The 1st Male dog, if only one is kept ..... \$3.00  
 Each additional male dog ..... \$5.00  
 The 1st female dog if only one is kept ..... \$6.00  
 Each additional female dog ..... \$10.00  
 Every male dog sexed ..... \$2.00  
 Every female dog spayed ..... \$2.00  
 Certificates to be supplied  
 The respective licenses will be procurable from the Assessor of the Municipality on February 15th of each and any year, and shall be paid to the Assessor on demand.  
 The license will be a tag and the same must be fastened on the dog at all times other than when the dog is legally hunting.  
 For any Contravention of this By-law any party or parties may be penalized under the Summary Convictions Act to the amount of \$50.00 exclusive of costs.  
 This By-law will be in full force and effect on the passing thereof.  
 By-Law read a third time, passed and numbered 5 this 23rd day of May, 1951.
