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

**T.B. Association Formed in Milton**

The first annual meeting of the Halton County Tuberculosis and Health Association was held at the Milton Inn on Monday evening, May 20th.

E. J. O'Brien, Executive Secretary of the Ontario Tuberculosis Association was present and explained to the meeting the necessity of having a county wide organization to support the Halton County Health Unit.

Since 1945, the Christmas Seal Campaign has been carried on by the Lions Club of Oakville with very gratifying results. Due to the need for expansion throughout the county, the club felt a county organization should be formed.

Mr. O'Brien explained committee members should be set up, to take care of rehabilitation of patients coming out of institutions, and that thus on Tuberculosis should be shown to various groups and organizations, under the heading of Education. He said that extension work could include pre-employment X-rays, tuberculosis testing of young school children and mass survey work. He also discussed the part the press could play in making the public conscious of the work being done and the results of the X-ray clinics.

The Association will sponsor all admission X-rays done at the Oakville-Trafalgar Memorial Hospital and the Milton Private Hospital that are not covered by other plans or organizations.

All monies raised by the Halton County Christmas Seal Fund will be used within the county for the prevention and treatment of tuberculosis.
