Jr. Farmers Vie With Scot Visitors

He went on to say that Scotland is very similar to the Canadian countryside with not as much bush but large trees in the woodlands.

David Hamilton, another of the Scottish Juniors that delighted the Halton boys by wearing a kilt, is from Bathgate, 16 miles west of Edinburgh. Rose Mary Stewart, one of the girls in the party, comes from Kelso and Anne Christie, the other member of the group, is from Sterling.

David expressed the thanks of the group for the hospitality in Halton. It was the first time they had been allowed to spend three consecutive nights in their bed.

Landing in Canada at Montreal on April 22 the Juniors, all members of Scottish Association of Young Farmers Clubs, will be in Canada until July 18. The group is a little disappointed at not being able to spend a few days in the Canadian west and they were quite shocked when they learned that the average farm acreage in Ontario was only 100 acres. "The average farm in Scotland is 200 acres," David pointed out.

Rose Mary confirmed David's comment that "It's no fun to be sick. Everyone laughs when I mention it but it's certainly no joke." Arthur's comment on Canadian girls was "Oh gee, I think they're wonderful." Anne Christie was a little more cautious when she commented "I'll tell you when the night's over," on how she liked Halton boys.

The Scottish party was selected for the Canadian trip by a series of interviews and eliminations. These farmers' sons and daughters visit beauty spots and historical points as well as the farms in the counties during their whirlwind tour of Ontario. They have visited 19 counties and have 20 to go in their program.

The group are guests of the Ontario Junior Farmers under the supervision of the Department of Agriculture.

Dave Pelletier, on behalf of the Halton Junior Farmers, welcomed the guests to the dance in the evening and introduced the four Scottish Juniors.

Ruth Hunt, Halton Home Economist, reported that 65 girls had completed homemaking units in the fall and winter program. Ruth Brown, Limehouse, was the winner of a Chicago trip and Mac Sprowl of R. R. 4, Acton was awarded the \$50 prize to finance an educational trip for the highest aggregate score in the Halton Junior Farmer judging competition.

The Donald Robertson trophy for the judging of horses went to Herb Wilson, Ward Brownridge won the Duncan Campbell trophy for beef cattle judging and the Baronston trophy for dairy cattle judging went to George Rogister.

In the sheep judging, Craig Featherstone was awarded the Mason Knitting Co. trophy. The award for the swine judging went to Earl Wilson who won the Thomas Blakecock trophy.

John Willmott was the winner of the Halton Junior Farmers' trip for the second highest aggregate score following Mac Sprowl and John W. Pickett won the Kingsway Kiwanis' Special as the runner-up for trips.

Esqueing Township captured the Bank of Nova Scotia trophy in the inter-township competition. Team members were Ward Brownridge, Fraser McNabb and Herb Wilson.

The Palermo Junior Farmers trophy to the coach of the high judging team went to David Pelletier on behalf of Craig Featherstone, Dave Lillycrop and Robert Marshall, members of the team.

Mac Sprowl coached the second prize team.

Norval Juniors captured the Dr. R. K. Anderson trophy for the highest club. Members were Fraser McNabb, John Currie, Stuart Alexander, Gordon Bird, Earl Wilson and Houson Ruddlell.

John Willmott was awarded the Norval Junior Farmers' trophy for the champion judge.
