### 1951 Traffic Toll Continues Higher

Traffic accidents in Ontario killed at least 62 persons last month, making April the third successive month to have more traffic deaths than the same month of last year.

This brings the 1951 accident toll up to 229 in four months (77 more than a year ago). Among the victims were 30 children compared with 31 last year, the only group that has not so far shown any increase. Pedestrian accidents are up least from last year; collisions of two or more vehicles are up the most. In April alone, out of 19 victims of two-vehicle accidents, seven (more than one-third) lost their lives by driving into parked cars or trucks, usually in the rear.

April accidents also included 18 deaths from leaving the road or hitting a fixed object, in these no other vehicle or pedestrian was involved.
