**ACTON'S THIRD WIN BALANCES THREE LOSSES; MILTON BOWS 4-3**

Blazing eleven hits off Milton right-hander "Boopie" Marshall, Acton Intermediate scored a 4-3 decision in a twilight fixture here last Friday night. It was Acton's third win against three losses and showed themselves to be the top in the Milton County league standing.

The victory was not without mishap, however. In the fifth inning, Western Norm Morton, filling in at second base, had his ankle broken and will be lost to the team for the rest of the season. Norm was a steady influence on the team and his presence in the line-up gave Acton much needed batting power.

The incident occurred when Chuck Gervais, Milton's right fielder, attempted to steal second base and Morton intercepted the throw at second in an effort to tag Gervais. Gervais slid into the bag but somehow collided with Morton. Norm fell, clutching for the elusive ball until the last but it was obvious something was wrong when he made no attempt to retrieve the ball after it was dropped. He was carried from the field, put into a car and taken to hospital where X-rays revealed his ankle was broken.

Don Ryder went the distance on the mound for Acton giving up five hits and whiffing nine. Melanson touched him for a triple in the second inning for the best hit of the night.

A three run spurge in the first inning gave Acton a lead they never relinquished. The Milton infield had trouble fielding freak bounces in that frame and a clutch hit from Townsley scored two runners.

Milton got one back in the second when Marshall beat out a roller and scored on Melanson's triple. Ryder doubled in the bottom half for Acton to lead off but was tagged off the bag on a nifty play at second.

In the third, Acton added one. Lindsay scoring on Tyler's single poked between second and short.

Milton rallied in the fifth scoring two runs as Toletzka doubled with Gervais on the road, scoring himself as the Acton infield booted the ball around.
