Solicitor Leatherland presented easements for signing by the Mayor and Clerk. The easements were for the sewerage pipe line that crosses private property between Fairy Lake and Main Street. A by-law was passed authorizing the Mayor and Clerk to sign the easements between the town and Beardmore and Co., George and Pearl Holmes, Ernest and Margaret Coles, Nellie and Birdie Hall, Albert and Vera Harris, Georgina and John Harris, Charles and Fern Shultis and Wm. Fryer.

Council considered the possibility of lining the roads rather than applying calcium as has been the practice. The road committee suggested prices be obtained and at least one street be tried.

Solicitor Leatherland pointed out that it was possible for the town to enter an agreement with the county for grants on roads classed as county connecting links on which 50 per cent grants from the county could be obtained.

The Town of Hespeler asked council to petition the Department of Highways regarding the inequality of grants on county roads. Acton council complained that the majority of work was being done in the south end of the county and endorsed the resolution unanimously.

The Duke of Devonshire Chapter IODE advised the council that they had made necessary arrangements for holding their cooking school in the town hall and asked the price of the hall per night. Council charged the usual price.

Deputy-reeve J. Stewart, chairman of the road committee, reported on his survey of some of the town streets. He pointed out the necessity of much minor and some major road work.

The police report for the month was presented. Councillor Thompson complained of the many petty fines that were being levied. Council debated the point and expressed the feeling that the fines were satisfactory.

Clerk McGeachie reported that the Rotary and Y's Men's arena rental cheques had been received. Council returned the cheques for the clubs' charitable work.

Mrs. Peter Smith asked the installation of a street light on the corner of Main and Queen Streets. The matter was left with the road committee for investigation.

Councillors L. Weick, J. Greer, C. Wood, A. Evers, E. Taylor, R. Thompson, Deputy-reeve Stewart and Reeve Hargrave were present. Mayor E. Tyler presided.

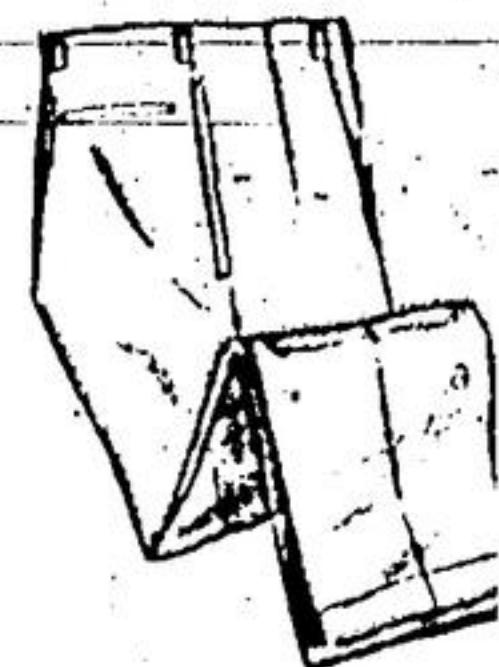
Miss Russell was an active worker and faithful attendant of Church, Hill United Church and in the work of the church, and among many friends she will be much missed.
