## Off To Slow Start Now Surprise Club

Off to a slow start early in the season, Acton Intermediates have developed into the surprise club of the Milton County circuit of late. This week they hammered out two convincing wins, indicating they intend to be around when play-off time rolls around even at the expense of the cellar clubs. Evidence of this intention was plentiful last night as they whipped Georgetown 5-0 in an abbreviated twilight game called at the end of the sixth on account of thundershowers.

The story was similar on Friday last at Waterdown where Acton chalked up an 8-4 victory over the Merchants. A six run outburst in the top half of the third after the first two batters had been retired, sewed the game up and was ample revenge for the loss Waterdown inflicted early in the season. Townsley's base clearing triple was the real blow.

Sam Snyder went the route on the hill for Acton, giving up only seven hits and spacing them well.

Big Pat Finnamore hulled the distance for Waterdown and was nicked for seven singles by the Acton lumber. Townsley led the Acton bats with three hits in four trips.

At Georgetown last night the Acton bats were really booming. They registered eleven hits off star-er Glen Gibbs in the five innings played. On the mound, corpulent Mel Jordan throw three hit ball-and-was full-value-for-the shut-out. It was a particularly good effort from Jordan who improves every time out. He was never really in trouble except when "Scotty" Patterson stepped in as a pinch hitter in the second inning with two men on base. Patterson tagged the ball hard to deep right but Ab Robinson, playing a scintillating game, made a circus catch of the drive to dim any hope of a rally.

"Babe" Allan paced the Actons at the plate with two hits—a double and a triple in three trips. Ab Robinson had a perfect night at bat with two hits in two trips, one a two master to deep right. Harold Townsley followed suit with two singles in three tries. Best man for Georgetown was first baseman Gilles with two identical hits to left field in two tries.

Last night's victory ran the Acton win skein to three straight and gives them five wins against three losses. The locals meet Oakville under the lights at the Oaks ball-park Friday p.m. with the possibility of a postponed game here on Saturday. Next Wednesday the club plays host to Milton here.

proposal to build two new schools in Acton and Georgetown and a gymnasium at the Milton School. Mr. Eastman's estimate of the cost of the new schools would be \$420,000 each and the gymnasium \$100,000. The new schools would each contain a gymnasium 40x60 feet; shop practice room of 1200 square feet; home economics room of 1000 square feet; library class room of 800 square feet; commercial of 1800 square feet; library, class rooms of 700 square feet each and a cafeteria classroom of 700 square feet.

Details of grant arrangements were also given and the attitude of the Department toward the expenditure. It was decided to have the secretary prepare information of costs for each municipality and when this was compiled the matter would be presented by the representatives of the municipalities to their council for endorsement.

It was also suggested that the Board visit some of the newly built schools such as Orangeville's to secure information about them and an offer was made to take the entire Board by bus. No definite action was taken.
