member it didn't come quickly but has been over thirty years on the agenda of the Department of Highways getting straightened out and smoothed down. Remember that when you are tempted to complain of local streets which have been disrupted for only a short time, if you're contemplating a trip between Acton and Milton, it won't be necessary to call us about the road conditions.

Our thanks to all who smoothed the way. The editor's regular daily trips ceased about a month ago.

**Black Asphalt**

You drive over miles of it. If it's smooth it's grand but if it is rough you discover it as no good but what is this asphalt road material that we find carrying vehicular traffic all over our highways. To find the answer we visited the plant of the Law Construction Co. on the fourth line in Equeusing Twp.

Here from a big stock pile of fine gravel obtained on the property, a big shovel digs in constantly and keeps a hovel full of material which is conveyed into a great steel tube. On the other end of the tube an oil burner heats the material and dries it and it is conveyed to the mixing machine where it is graded and put into bins.

Here an operator surrounded by his controls, puts into the mixer a weighed batch of two different kinds of gravel. Another lever is pulled and into the huge mixer goes a batch of hot asphalt forced through pipe from an adjacent tank and heated at all times.

When properly mixed, another lever puts the hot mixture at a temperature of 275 degrees, 2 tons of it go into the waiting dump truck. Over the scales for a final weighing it goes and away to be spread on the highways to make smooth travel. It takes many loads to lay a mile of highway material nearly three inches in depth and 20 feet wide and all day long the machines grind away mixing and hauling material.

It's an interesting plant that is mixing the material, for No. 25 highway. The operation here will soon be completed and the equipment moved elsewhere.
