## TOLETZKA TOPPLES TANNERS' TEAM HITS HOMER WITH BASES LOADED

Eric Toletzka's grand slam home run in the top of the sixth inning erased a 4-3 Acton lead and enabled Milton Intermediates to exact an 8-4 win last night in a scheduled game at Acton. The game was a benefit for Norm Morton, who had his ankle broken in the previous game between the two teams which Acton won.

Toletzka's circuit smash came with two out and the bases loaded on a double, a pitched ball and a walk. Acton was never in contention after the blow. It was a solid hit and the Acton left gardener had no chance to make a catch. It was one of eleven hits Milton pilfered from southpaw Don Ryder, who went the distance on the hill for Acton.

The Acton club garnered only 5 hits from Doucette, making his first appearance with the Red Caps since his try-out with the Cleveland Indian chain. Townsley led the Acton bats with three hits in four trips to the plate. Eric Tol-

etzka was easily the pick of Milton, cashing in four hits—a home run, double and two singles—in as many trips.

Both clubs racked up two runs in the first innings. Helpel and Toletzka scored for Milton on three safeties. Masters and Allen scored for Acton when Townsley smashed a ground ball between second and short.

The sixth saw Toletzka's home run with three on and in the seventh Stover singled, scoring on a wild throw to sew the game up.

## PUC Discuss Mains, Children on Tank

A letter was read from the Compensation Board re a claim of the Commission's. This was to be turned over to Solicitor Leatherland.

A letter from the O.M.E.A. and A.M.E.U. stated that at a joint meeting of these associations, it was decided to petition the H.E.P.C. for an increased coverage of the public liability insurance. The proposed increase is to 50/100/50. The Commission asked for the rates to be charged before they would indicate whether or not they were in favor of this increase.

Four applications were received for the position of clerk in the P.U.C. office. The application of Miss Doreen Cole was accepted at a salary of \$1300 per annum, with her work to start immediately.

Superintendent Mason reported that arrangements had been made with the H.E.P.C. for joint use of the power line coming into Acton from the west on No. 7 Highway.

Superintendent Mason was also instructed to purchase a 25 K.V.A. transformer to have on hand when the Fall Fair is held as it will be needed for the supplying of power to the concessionaires.

Superintendent Lambert reported that there were four manholes and three valve boxes raised on No. 25 Highway to be level with the new road.

The Commission inspected a hydrant on Guelph St. which was broken by a car and repaired by Supt. Lambert. After discussing the matter, a motion was passed to allow the hydrant back making an allowance for a four foot sidewalk. This would only mean the extension of the present pipe feeding the hydrant by five feet and the inclusion of a shut-off valve.
