Miss Jean Harris moved a hearty vote of thanks to Mrs. Rognvaldson for her hospitality.

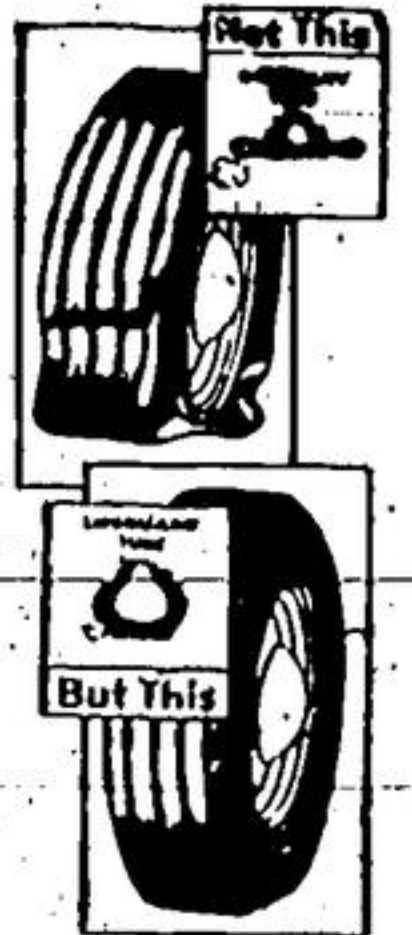
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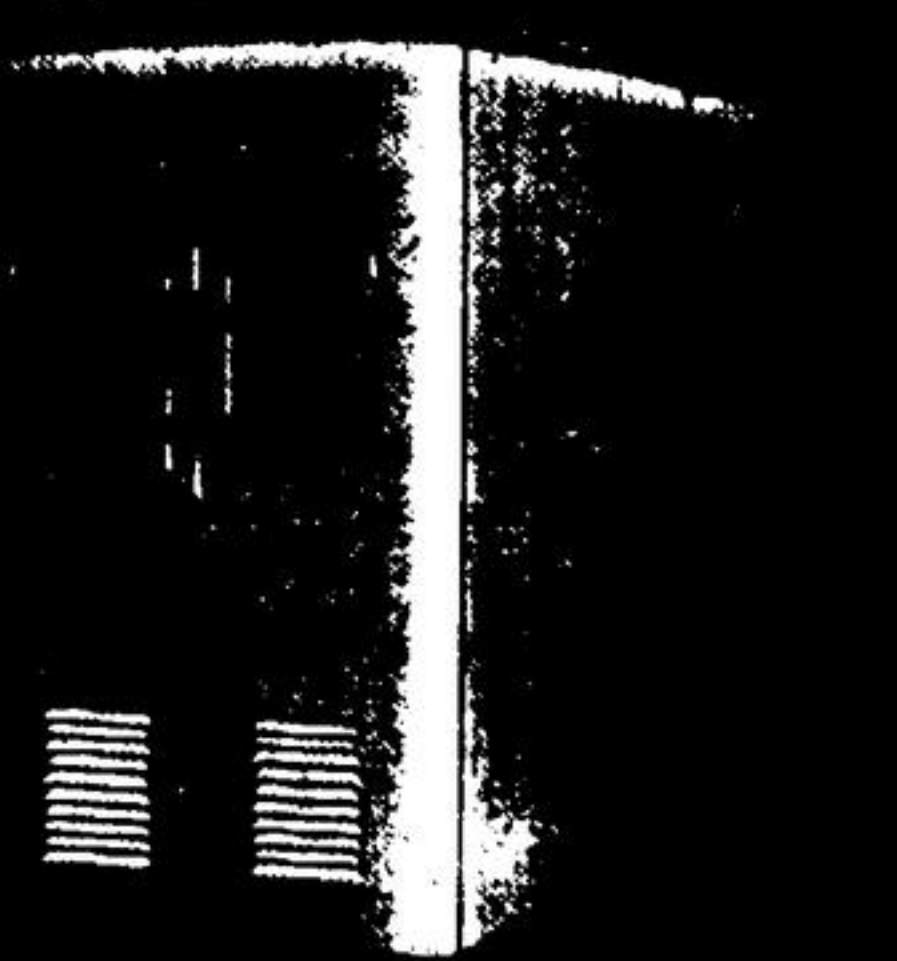


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
