Special Guests Commend W.I. Work of 50 Years

In Halton we have a farm people second to none in the province of Ontario. J. E. Whitelock, the county's agricultural representative, stated joyfully to about 350 representatives of the 38 branches of the Women's Institute in the county. In February, 1901, ten ladies met in Milton to form the first W.I. branch in Halton County, and on Tuesday the fiftieth anniversary of this organization was observed in Milton arena with a luncheon and special program.

Long tables, decorated with bouquets of flowers and blue and gold streamers, were set with full salad plates as the ladies sat down after registering at the door to the arena. Pia with whipped cream and tea followed. The W.A. of St. David's Church, Campbellville, catered.

While the representatives were enjoying their lunch, they paused as Mrs. Albert Biggar of Omagh, 90, cut the tiered white birthday cake in the centre of the head table.

Mrs. Milton Brown of Hornby greeted all who had come to celebrate 50 years of work in Halton County. She wondered if W.I. members in 2001 would be as proud as those there were this week. Second vice-president Mrs. E. A. Manning, Hornby, introduced a candle-lighting ceremony, with Mrs. Rinehart of Nassagaweya, the immediate past president, lighting a candle for those who had gone before; Mrs. Milton Brown lighting hers for the present members and Mrs. J. L. Ellerby of Acton, first vice-president, for the future. These three flames burned brightly during the afternoon.

Congratulatory notes were read by Mrs. Cromar, a member of the Georgetown W.I., who recited an incident concerning an Indian 'potentate' and a humble Scots family—in dialect. Her other two numbers were 'Snores' and 'Myself'.

Tuesday's gathering was compared by the provincial secretary, Mrs. J. H. McCullough of Brampton, to ladies' meetings she attended last summer in Denmark, Sweden, Scotland and Holland. She also recalled when she was the provincial board director for Halton in 1929. This year's provincial director, Mrs. Loren Guild of Rockwood, then spoke briefly.
