## ACTON BALL CREW UP AND DOWN WHITWASHING ISSUED CLARKSON

Splitting the week's game in the Milton County league activity, Acton Intermediates pretty well covered both extremities in the hitting department. On Saturday afternoon here, while whitewashing Clarkson 10-0 they hammered out 21 hits in an over-powering onslaught that saw batting averages fattened by everyone involved. Last night, however, at Waterdown, the locals were restricted to four solitary hits as the Merchants walked off with a 6-4, seven-inning victory.

Saturday, there was no stopping the Acton crew. Sam Snyder, on the hill, pitched superlative ball, had air tight support from the infield and the Acton bats were readily chattering. Owen Mannes paced the parade with five safeties in six trips, one a double. Bob Bruce, Lorne Masters and "Babe" Allen weren't far behind. Bruce smashed four hits in five trips while Masters pounded out a three for five. Allen, one of the most improved players on the club, garnered three bingles in six trips as well as playing the first sack position flawlessly.

Clarkson could only nick three hits from Sam Snyder's offerings and none in the two innings Harry Lawson hurled. Lawson rejoined the team after a lay-off of a year out of Acton livery. He played with Galt Pups in the Junior Intercounty last semester. Clarkson made futile attempts to break into the scoring column but couldn't dent the tight defensive armour presented in the Acton infield. Clarkson is an Intermediate A team.

Failure to come through in the pinches plus some wild-throw and mental lapses cost Acton the game at Waterdown last night where a fanatical crowd watched Waterdown come through with five runs in a big third inning to put the game in the bag. With two men on base an intentional walk was issued to big Pat Finnamore. The bases were loaded when Mel Jordan threw to third catching the runner off the base but the throw went wild and a run scored. Jacobs emptied the bags with a long two base hit to centre to make the score three-all. Stonehouse walked and both he and Jacobs stole home in front of the astonished Acton battery.

Added from two wild throws he made, Mel Jordan hurled fine ball. He was stingy with hits, doling out five. Waterdown used two men on the hill. Jacobs started but was lifted in the top of the third in favour of Finnamore, when Townsley doubled to centre for an R.B.I. That move paid dividends for the Merchants for Finnamore set Acton down with their bats on their shoulders with men on base on four separate occasions. "Babe" Allen was the only Acton player to size up Finnamore's assortment. He poled two long doubles to right field in four trips.

Acton is scheduled to meet Georgetown in Georgetown on Friday night with the possibility of a postponed game with Oakville being played here tonight (Thursday). Next Wednesday Acton's play host to the mighty Oakville Oaks, who are as yet undefeated. Manager Norm Morton might have some unpleasant moments for the Oaks, however, if he can field a full team.

The Actons have been strengthened with the addition of Harry Lawson who worked two innings Saturday here and with a little practice should be in the shape that earned him a try-out with the New York Yankee chain. Jack Hough, who has yet to show for a game, is also slated to appear in the line-up. Sickness at home and transportation difficulties have kept "Happy" Lawson, the little shortstop from appearing in many games but it now appears these difficulties are solved and Lawson will probably be in uniform most of the remaining games. He played on Saturday, smashing out two hits in as many appearances at the plate.

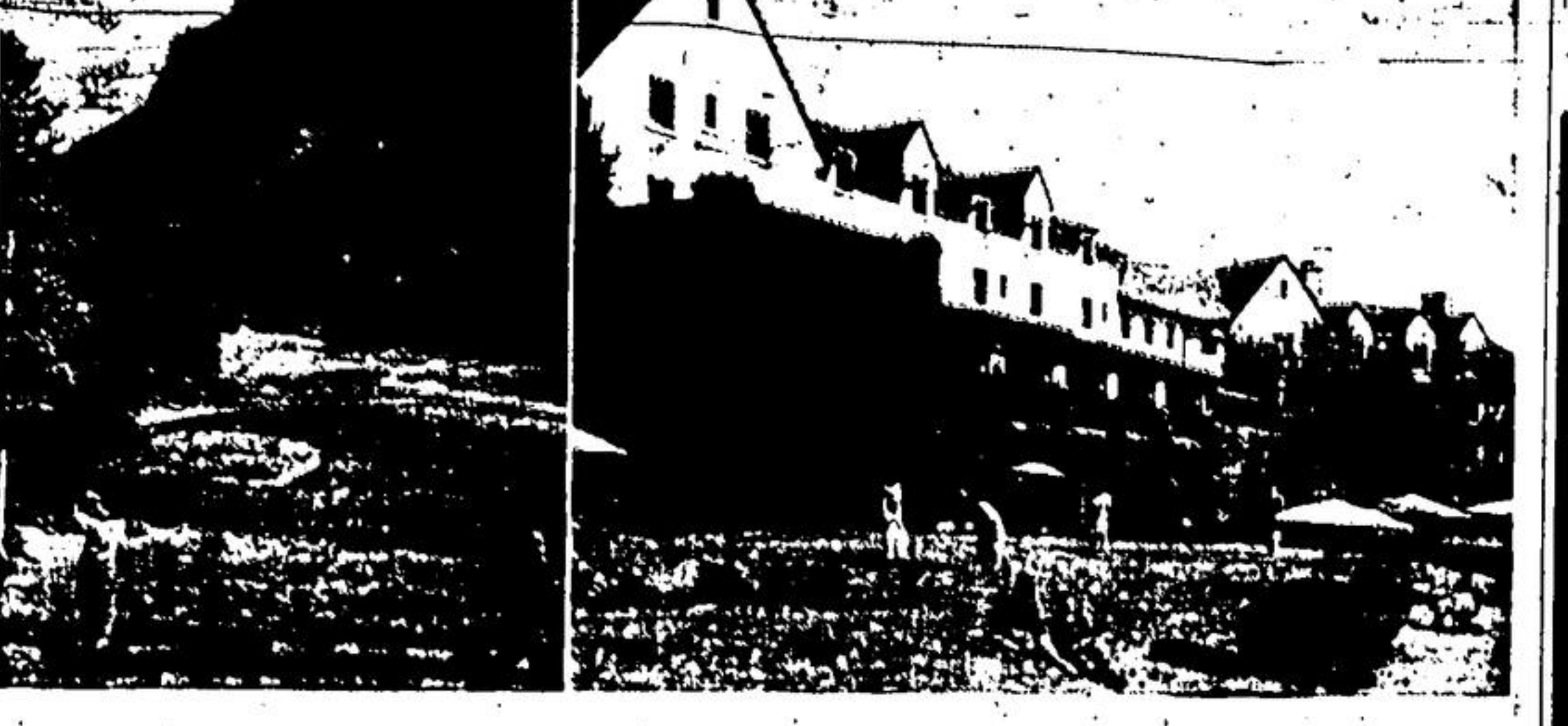
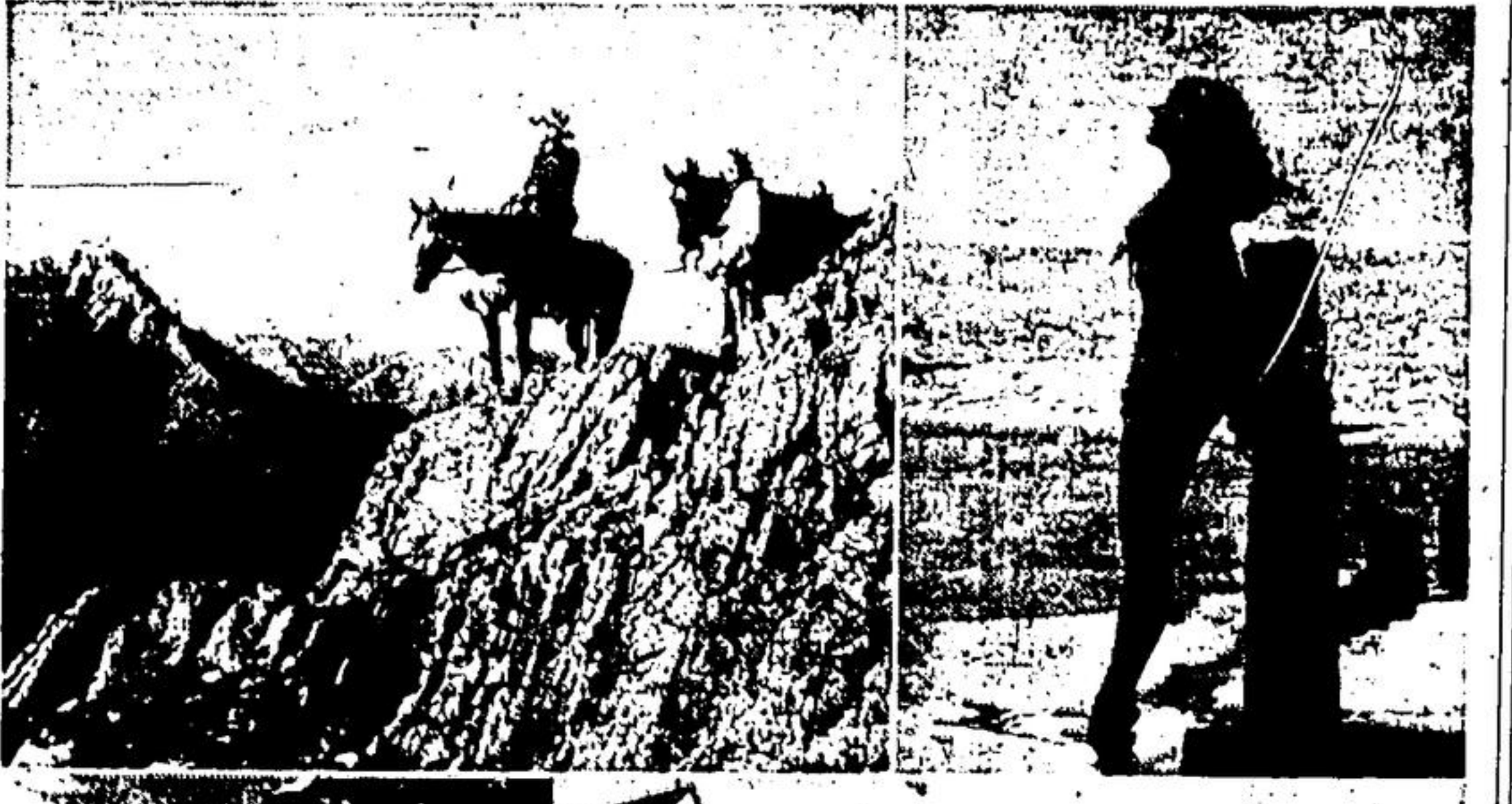
